

1 AN ACT relating to firearms and declaring an emergency.

2 *Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky:*

3 ➔SECTION 1. A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 237 IS CREATED TO
4 READ AS FOLLOWS:

5 *As used in this chapter:*

6 *(1) (a) "Assault weapon" means:*

7 *1. A semiautomatic rifle that has an ability to accept a detachable*
8 *magazine and has at least one (1) of the following characteristics:*

9 *a. A folding or telescoping stock;*

10 *b. A pistol grip that protrudes conspicuously beneath the action of*
11 *the weapon;*

12 *c. A second handgrip or a protruding grip that can be held by the*
13 *nontrigger hand;*

14 *d. A bayonet mount;*

15 *e. A flash suppressor, muzzle break, muzzle compensator, or*
16 *threaded barrel designed to accommodate a flash suppressor,*
17 *muzzle break, or muzzle compensator; or*

18 *f. A grenade launcher;*

19 *2. A semiautomatic shotgun that has at least one (1) of the following*
20 *characteristics:*

21 *a. A folding or telescoping stock;*

22 *b. A second handgrip or a protruding grip that can be held by the*
23 *nontrigger hand;*

24 *c. A fixed magazine capacity in excess of seven (7) rounds; or*

25 *d. An ability to accept a detachable magazine; or*

26 *3. A semiautomatic pistol that has an ability to accept a detachable*
27 *magazine and has at least one (1) of the following characteristics:*

- 1 a. A folding or telescoping stock;
- 2 b. A second handgrip or a protruding grip that can be held by the
- 3 nontrigger hand;
- 4 c. Capacity to accept an ammunition magazine that attaches to the
- 5 pistol outside of the pistol grip;
- 6 d. A threaded barrel capable of accepting a barrel extender, flash
- 7 suppressor, forward handgrip, or silencer;
- 8 e. A shroud that is attached to, or partially or completely encircles,
- 9 the barrel and that permits the shooter to hold the firearm with
- 10 the non-trigger hand without being burned; or
- 11 f. A manufactured weight of fifty (50) ounces or more when the
- 12 pistol is unloaded;
- 13 4. A semiautomatic version of an automatic rifle, shotgun, or firearm; or
- 14 5. A revolving cylinder shotgun.
- 15 (b) "Assault weapon" does not include:
- 16 1. Any rifle, shotgun, or pistol that is manually operated by bolt, pump,
- 17 lever, or slide action, which has been rendered permanently
- 18 inoperable, or which is an antique firearm as defined in 18 U.S.C. sec.
- 19 921(a)(16);
- 20 2. A semiautomatic rifle that cannot accept a detachable magazine that
- 21 holds more than five (5) rounds of ammunition; or
- 22 3. A semiautomatic shotgun that cannot hold more than five (5) rounds
- 23 of ammunition in a fixed or detachable magazine;
- 24 (2) "Large-capacity ammunition-feeding device" means a magazine, belt, drum, feed
- 25 strip, or similar device that has a capacity of, or that can be readily restored or
- 26 converted to accept, more than seven (7) rounds of ammunition, but does not
- 27 include an attached tubular device designed to accept and capable of operating

1 only with, .22 caliber rimfire ammunition or a feeding device that is a curio or
2 relic. To qualify as a curio or relic feeding device under this subsection, it must
3 be a feeding device that:

4 (a) Was manufactured at least fifty (50) years prior to the current date, not
5 including replicas thereof;

6 (b) Is only capable of being used exclusively in a firearm, rifle, or shotgun that
7 was manufactured at least fifty (50) years prior to the current date, not
8 including replicas thereof;

9 (c) Is possessed by an individual who is not prohibited by state or federal law
10 from possessing a firearm; and

11 (d) Is registered with the Department of Kentucky State Police pursuant to
12 Section 15 of this Act; and

13 (3) "Seller of ammunition" means any person, firm, partnership, corporation, or
14 company that engages in the business of purchasing, selling, or keeping
15 ammunition.

16 ➔SECTION 2. A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 237 IS CREATED TO
17 READ AS FOLLOWS:

18 (1) In addition to any other requirement of state or federal law, all sales, exchanges,
19 or transfers of firearms shall be conducted in accordance with this section unless
20 the sale, exchange, or transfer is:

21 (a) Conducted by a licensed importer, licensed manufacturer, or licensed
22 dealer, as those terms are defined in 18 U.S.C. secs. 921 and 922, when the
23 sale, exchange, or transfer is conducted pursuant to that person's federal
24 firearms license; or

25 (b) Between spouses, children, and stepchildren in the same immediate family.

26 (2) Before any sale, exchange, or transfer pursuant to this section, a national instant
27 criminal background check shall be completed by a dealer who consents to

1 conduct a check, and upon completion of the background check, shall complete a
2 document, the form of which shall be developed and distributed by the
3 Department of Kentucky State Police, that identifies and confirms that the check
4 was performed.

5 (3) In addition to any sales log-keeping requirements created under Section 15 of
6 this Act or any other requirement of state or federal law, all dealers shall
7 maintain a record of transactions and of background checks conducted pursuant
8 to this section, and the records shall be maintained on the premises mentioned
9 and described in the dealer's license, and shall be open at all reasonable hours
10 for inspection by any peace officer acting pursuant to his or her duties.

11 (4) A dealer may require that any sale or transfer conducted pursuant to this section
12 be subject to a fee not to exceed ten dollars (\$10) per transaction.

13 (5) Any record produced pursuant to this section and any transmission thereof to any
14 government agency shall not be considered a public record for purposes of the
15 Kentucky Open Records Act, KRS 61.870 to 61.884.

16 (6) Any person who knowingly violates this section shall be guilty of a Class A
17 misdemeanor.

18 ➔SECTION 3. A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 237 IS CREATED TO
19 READ AS FOLLOWS:

20 (1) Any owner or other person lawfully in possession of a firearm who suffers the
21 loss or theft of the firearm or any person who sells ammunition who suffers a loss
22 or theft of ammunition shall, within twenty-four (24) hours of the discovery of the
23 loss or theft, report the facts and circumstances of the loss or theft to a local
24 police department or sheriff's office. The report shall contain, if known, the
25 caliber, make, model, manufacturer's name and serial number, if any, and any
26 other distinguishing number or identification mark on the firearm, or the make,
27 type, and caliber of the ammunition. The local police department or sheriff's

1 office shall forward a copy of the report to the Department of Kentucky State
2 Police.

3 (2) The Department of Kentucky State Police shall:

4 (a) Receive, collect, and file the information referred to in subsection (1) of this
5 section. The department shall cooperate, and undertake to furnish or make
6 available to law enforcement agencies this information, for the purpose of
7 coordinating law enforcement efforts to locate the firearm or ammunition;
8 and

9 (b) Promulgate any administrative regulations necessary to implement this
10 section.

11 (3) A person who fails to make a report of a loss or theft as required by subsection (1)
12 of this section shall be guilty of a Class A misdemeanor.

13 ➔SECTION 4. A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 237 IS CREATED TO
14 READ AS FOLLOWS:

15 (1) A person who owns or is custodian of a firearm shall not store or otherwise leave
16 the firearm out of his or her immediate possession or control without having first
17 securely locked the firearm in an appropriate safe storage depository or rendered
18 it incapable of being fired by use of a gun-locking device appropriate to that
19 weapon, including through the use of a safe or other secure container which,
20 when locked, is incapable of being opened without the key, combination, or other
21 unlocking mechanism and is capable of preventing an unauthorized person from
22 obtaining access to and possession of its contents.

23 (2) A violation of this section shall be a Class A misdemeanor.

24 ➔Section 5. KRS 395.250 is amended to read as follows:

25 It shall be the duty of a personal representative of a decedent to return an inventory in
26 duplicate within two (2) months from the time of qualifying as such, to the clerk's office
27 of the court in which he or she qualified, the original of which shall be recorded by the

1 clerk and the duplicate shall be mailed by the clerk to the secretary of revenue. *The*
2 *inventory shall include a particularized description of every firearm that is part of the*
3 *estate, and if a firearm is included, a copy of the inventory shall be provided to the*
4 *Department of Kentucky State Police.* Copies from the record of the inventory or
5 appraisal shall be prima facie evidence for or against such representative.

6 ➔Section 6. KRS 403.735 is amended to read as follows:

7 (1) Prior to or at a hearing on a petition for an order of protection:

8 (a) The court may obtain the respondent's Kentucky criminal and protective order
9 history and utilize that information to assess what relief and which sanctions
10 may protect against danger to the petitioner or other person for whom
11 protection is being sought, with the information so obtained being provided to
12 the parties in accordance with the Rules of Civil Procedure; and

13 (b) If the petitioner or respondent is a minor, the court shall inquire whether the
14 parties attend school in the same school system to assist the court in imposing
15 conditions in the order that have the least disruption in the administration of
16 education to the parties while providing appropriate protection to the
17 petitioner.

18 (2) (a) If the adverse party is not present at the hearing ordered pursuant to KRS
19 403.730 and has not been served, a previously issued emergency protective
20 order shall remain in place, and the court shall direct the issuance of a new
21 summons for a hearing set not more than fourteen (14) days in the future. If
22 service has not been made on the adverse party before that hearing or a
23 subsequent hearing, the emergency protective order shall remain in place, and
24 the court shall continue the hearing and issue a new summons with a new date
25 and time for the hearing to occur, which shall be within fourteen (14) days of
26 the originally scheduled date for the continued hearing. The court shall repeat
27 the process of continuing the hearing and reissuing a new summons until the

1 adverse party is served in advance of the scheduled hearing. If service has not
2 been made on the respondent at least seventy-two (72) hours prior to the
3 scheduled hearing, the court may continue the hearing no more than fourteen
4 (14) days in the future. In issuing the summons, the court shall simultaneously
5 transmit a copy of the summons or notice of its issuance and provisions to the
6 petitioner.

7 (b) The provisions of this section permitting the continuance of an emergency
8 protective order shall be limited to six (6) months from the issuance of the
9 emergency protective order. If the respondent has not been served within that
10 period, the order shall be rescinded without prejudice. Prior to the expiration
11 of the emergency protective order, the court shall provide notice to the
12 petitioner stating that, if the petitioner does not file a new petition, the order
13 shall be rescinded without prejudice.

14 (c) In issuing an order of protection or in considering any requested
15 modifications to or violations of an existing order of protection, the court
16 shall make a determination of whether there is a substantial risk that the
17 respondent may use or threaten to use a firearm unlawfully against the
18 person for whose protection the order of protection is issued. If the court
19 finds that a substantial risk exists, the court shall order that the respondent
20 be prohibited from possessing a firearm and shall order him or her to
21 surrender any firearms owned or possessed by the respondent to the sheriff
22 of the county where the firearm is located, who shall impound the weapon
23 until the prohibition is lifted, the order expires, or the respondent directs the
24 transfer of the weapon to a person lawfully allowed to possess the firearm.

25 ➔Section 7. KRS 504.030 is amended to read as follows:

26 (1) When a defendant is found not guilty by reason of insanity, the court shall:

27 (a) Conduct an involuntary hospitalization proceeding under KRS Chapter 202A

1 or 202B; and

2 (b) Order in open court that the defendant be prohibited from possessing a
3 firearm and shall also order him or her to surrender any firearms owned or
4 possessed by the defendant to the sheriff of the county where the firearm is
5 located. The sheriff shall impound the weapon until the order expires or is
6 lifted, the conviction is altered, amended, or vacated, the defendant is
7 granted a pardon, or the respondent directs the transfer of the weapon to a
8 person lawfully allowed to possess the firearm.

9 (2) To facilitate the procedure established in subsection (1) of this section, the court
10 may order the detention of the defendant for a period of ten (10) days to allow for
11 proceedings to be initiated against the defendant for examination and possible
12 detention pursuant to the provisions of KRS Chapter 202A or 202B.

13 ➔Section 8. KRS 237.104 is amended to read as follows:

14 (1) No person, unit of government, or governmental organization shall, during a period
15 of disaster or emergency as specified in KRS Chapter 39A or at any other time,
16 have the right to revoke, suspend, limit the use of, or otherwise impair the validity
17 of the right of any person to purchase, transfer, loan, own, possess, carry, or use a
18 firearm, firearm part, ammunition, ammunition component, or any deadly weapon
19 or dangerous instrument.

20 (2) No person, unit of government, or governmental organization shall, during a period
21 of disaster or emergency as specified in KRS Chapter 39A or at any other time,
22 take, seize, confiscate, or impound a firearm, firearm part, ammunition, ammunition
23 component, or any deadly weapon or dangerous instrument from any person.

24 (3) The provisions of this section shall not apply to the taking of an item specified in
25 subsection (1) or (2) of this section from a person who is:

26 (a) Forbidden to possess a firearm pursuant to KRS 527.040 or Section 6, 7, or
27 14 of this Act;

- 1 (b) Forbidden to possess a firearm pursuant to federal law;
- 2 (c) Violating KRS 527.020;
- 3 (d) In possession of a stolen firearm;
- 4 (e) Using a firearm in the commission of a separate criminal offense; or
- 5 (f) Using a firearm or other weapon in the commission of an offense under KRS
- 6 Chapter 150.

7 ➔Section 9. KRS 506.080 is amended to read as follows:

- 8 (1) A person is guilty of criminal facilitation when, acting with knowledge that another
- 9 person is committing or intends to commit a crime, he or she engages in conduct
- 10 which knowingly provides such person with means or opportunity for the
- 11 commission of the crime and which in fact aids such person to commit the crime,
- 12 including making available, selling, exchanging, giving, or disposing of a
- 13 firearm.

- 14 (2) Criminal facilitation is a:

- 15 (a) Class D felony when the crime facilitated is a Class A or Class B felony or
- 16 capital offense;
- 17 (b) Class A misdemeanor when the crime facilitated is a Class C or Class D
- 18 felony;
- 19 (c) Class B misdemeanor when the crime facilitated is a misdemeanor.

20 ➔Section 10. KRS 508.020 is amended to read as follows:

- 21 (1) A person is guilty of assault in the second degree when:
- 22 (a) He or she intentionally causes serious physical injury to another person;~~{or}~~
- 23 (b) He or she intentionally causes physical injury to another person by means of a
- 24 deadly weapon or a dangerous instrument;~~{or}~~
- 25 (c) He or she wantonly causes serious physical injury to another person by means
- 26 of a deadly weapon or a dangerous instrument; or
- 27 (d) He or she wantonly causes physical injury to a minor by intentionally

1 *discharging a firearm.*

2 (2) Assault in the second degree is a Class C felony.

3 ➔SECTION 11. A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 527 IS CREATED TO
4 READ AS FOLLOWS:

5 *(1) A person is guilty of criminal purchase or transfer of a weapon when knowing*
6 *that:*

7 *(a) He or she is prohibited by law from possessing a firearm because of a prior*
8 *conviction or is otherwise ineligible to lawfully possess a firearm under state*
9 *or federal law, the person purchases a firearm from another person;*

10 *(b) It would be unlawful for another person to possess a firearm, he or she*
11 *purchases a firearm for, on behalf of, or for the use of that other person; or*

12 *(c) Another person is prohibited by law from possessing a firearm because of a*
13 *prior conviction or is otherwise ineligible to lawfully possess a firearm*
14 *under state or federal law, a person transfers a firearm to that other person.*

15 *(2) Criminal purchase or transfer of a weapon is a Class D felony.*

16 ➔Section 12. KRS 527.040 is amended to read as follows:

17 (1) A person is guilty of possession of a firearm by a convicted felon when he *or she*
18 possesses, manufactures, or transports a firearm when he *or she* has been convicted
19 of a felony, as defined by the laws of the jurisdiction in which he *or she* was
20 convicted, in any state or federal court and has not:

21 (a) Been granted a full pardon by the Governor or by the President of the United
22 States; or

23 (b) Been granted relief by the United States Secretary of the Treasury pursuant to
24 the Federal Gun Control Act of 1968, as amended.

25 (2) (a) Possession of a firearm by a convicted felon is a Class D felony unless the
26 firearm possessed is a handgun in which case it is a Class C felony.

27 (b) If a felon is convicted of a criminal offense other than possession of a firearm

1 by a convicted felon, and he or she possessed a firearm in commission of that
 2 offense, then the felon shall be penalized for violating this section one (1)
 3 class more severely if it is a second or subsequent violation of this section.

4 **(c) Sentences for violation of this section shall be served subsequent to the**
 5 **service of any other felony sentence imposed on the offender.**

6 (3) The provisions of this section shall apply to any youthful offender convicted of a
 7 felony offense under the laws of this Commonwealth. The exceptions contained in
 8 KRS 527.100 prohibiting possession of a handgun by a minor shall not apply to this
 9 section.

10 (4) The provisions of this section with respect to handguns, shall apply only to persons
 11 convicted after January 1, 1975, and with respect to other firearms, to persons
 12 convicted after July 15, 1994.

13 ➔Section 13. KRS 527.070 is amended to read as follows:

14 (1) A person is guilty of unlawful possession of a weapon on school property when he
 15 **or she** knowingly deposits, possesses, or carries, whether openly or concealed, for
 16 purposes other than instructional or school-sanctioned ceremonial purposes, or the
 17 purposes permitted in subsection (3) of this section, any firearm or other deadly
 18 weapon, destructive device, or booby trap device in any **postsecondary education**
 19 **facility**, public or private school building or bus, on any public or private school
 20 campus, grounds, recreation area, athletic field, or any other property owned, used,
 21 or operated by any **institute of postsecondary education**, board of education,
 22 school, board of trustees, regents, or directors for the administration of any public
 23 or private educational institution. ~~The provisions of this section shall not apply to~~
 24 ~~institutions of postsecondary or higher education.~~

25 (2) Each chief administrator of a public or private school shall display about the school
 26 in prominent locations, including~~[,]~~ but not limited to~~[,]~~ sports arenas, gymnasiums,
 27 stadiums, and cafeterias, a sign at least six (6) inches high and fourteen (14) inches

1 wide stating:

2 UNLAWFUL POSSESSION OF A WEAPON ON SCHOOL
3 PROPERTY IN KENTUCKY IS A FELONY PUNISHABLE
4 BY A MAXIMUM OF FIVE (5) YEARS IN PRISON AND A
5 TEN THOUSAND DOLLAR (\$10,000) FINE.

6 Failure to post the sign shall not relieve any person of liability under this section.

7 (3) The provisions of this section prohibiting the unlawful possession of a weapon on
8 school property shall not apply to:

9 (a) An adult who is not a pupil of any secondary school and who possesses a
10 firearm, if the firearm is contained within a vehicle operated by the adult and
11 is not removed from the vehicle, except for a purpose permitted herein, or
12 brandished by the adult, or by any other person acting with expressed or
13 implied consent of the adult, while the vehicle is on school property;

14 (b) Any pupils who are members of the reserve officers training corps or pupils
15 enrolled in a course of instruction or members of a school club or team, to the
16 extent they are required to carry arms or weapons in the discharge of their
17 official class or team duties;

18 (c) Any peace officer or police officer authorized to carry a concealed weapon
19 pursuant to KRS 527.020;

20 (d) Persons employed by the Armed Forces of the United States or members of
21 the National Guard or militia when required in the discharge of their official
22 duties to carry arms or weapons;

23 (e) Civil officers of the United States in the discharge of their official duties.
24 Nothing in this section shall be construed as to allow any person to carry a
25 concealed weapon into a public or private elementary or secondary school
26 building;

27 (f) Any other persons, including, but not limited to, exhibitors of historical

- 1 displays, who have been authorized to carry a firearm by the board of
2 education or board of trustees of the public or private institution;
- 3 (g) A person hunting during the lawful hunting season on lands owned by any
4 public or private educational institution and designated as open to hunting by
5 the board of education or board of trustees of the educational institution;
- 6 (h) A person possessing unloaded hunting weapons while traversing the grounds
7 of any public or private educational institution for the purpose of gaining
8 access to public or private lands open to hunting with the intent to hunt on the
9 public or private lands, unless the lands of the educational institution are
10 posted prohibiting the entry; or
- 11 (i) A person possessing guns or knives when conducting or attending a "gun and
12 knife show" when the program has been approved by the board of education
13 or board of trustees of the educational institution.
- 14 (4) Unlawful possession of a weapon on school property is a Class D felony.
- 15 ➔Section 14. KRS 532.030 is amended to read as follows:
- 16 (1) When a person is convicted of a capital offense, he or she shall have his or her
17 punishment fixed at death, or at a term of imprisonment for life without benefit of
18 probation or parole, or at a term of imprisonment for life without benefit of
19 probation or parole until he or she has served a minimum of twenty-five (25) years
20 of his or her sentence, or to a sentence of life, or to a term of not less than twenty
21 (20) years nor more than fifty (50) years.
- 22 (2) When a person is convicted of a Class A felony, he or she shall have his
23 punishment fixed at imprisonment in accordance with KRS 532.060.
- 24 (3) When a person is convicted of an offense other than a capital offense or Class A
25 felony, he or she shall have his or her punishment fixed at:
- 26 (a) A term of imprisonment authorized by this chapter; or
27 (b) A fine authorized by KRS Chapter 534; or

1 (c) Both imprisonment and a fine unless precluded by the provisions of KRS
2 Chapter 534.

3 (4) When a person is convicted of any capital offense, felony offense, or offense
4 where the defendant is found guilty but mentally ill, the judge pronouncing
5 sentence shall order in open court that the defendant be prohibited from
6 possessing a firearm and shall order him or her to surrender any firearms owned
7 or possessed by the defendant to the sheriff of the county where the firearm is
8 located, who shall impound the weapon until the prohibition is lifted, the
9 conviction is altered, amended, or vacated, the defendant is granted a pardon, or
10 the respondent directs the transfer of the weapon to a person lawfully allowed to
11 possess the firearm.

12 (5) In all cases in which the death penalty may be authorized the judge shall instruct the
13 jury in accordance with subsection (1) of this section. The instructions shall state,
14 subject to the aggravating and mitigating limitations and requirements of KRS
15 532.025, that the jury may recommend upon a conviction for a capital offense a
16 sentence of death, or at a term of imprisonment for life without benefit of probation
17 or parole, or a term of imprisonment for life without benefit of probation or parole
18 until the defendant has served a minimum of twenty-five (25) years of his or her
19 sentence, or a sentence of life, or to a term of not less than twenty (20) years nor
20 more than fifty (50) years.

21 ➔SECTION 15. A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 237 IS CREATED TO
22 READ AS FOLLOWS:

23 (1) (a) The Department of Kentucky State Police shall promulgate an
24 administrative regulation for the licensure of persons to possess a handgun
25 in the Commonwealth of Kentucky. The administrative regulation shall
26 prohibit the possession of a handgun by a person in Kentucky unless the
27 person holds a license or falls within an exemption that the Department of

1 Kentucky State Police may create in the administrative regulation. The
2 license shall be available to persons who are at least twenty-one (21) years
3 old or have been honorably discharged from the Armed Forces of the
4 United States, meet the eligibility criteria established by the department, and
5 are not otherwise prohibited by state or federal law from possessing a
6 handgun.

7 (b) The Department of Kentucky State Police may establish a fee for
8 applications for a license sufficient to cover the costs of administering the
9 program.

10 (c) Licenses issued under this subsection shall be effective for no longer than
11 five (5) years.

12 (d) Persons receiving a license under this subsection shall be given the option
13 of deciding whether the license shall be public or private. If the registration
14 is private, the record shall not be a public record under the Kentucky Open
15 Records Act, KRS 61.870 to 61.884.

16 (e) Any person who possesses a handgun in violation of the administrative
17 regulations promulgated under this subsection shall be guilty of a Class A
18 misdemeanor.

19 (2) (a) The Department of Kentucky State Police shall promulgate an
20 administrative regulation for the registration of handguns in Kentucky. The
21 administrative regulation shall prohibit the possession of an unregistered
22 handgun by a person in Kentucky unless the handgun falls within an
23 exemption that the Department of Kentucky State Police may create in the
24 administrative regulation.

25 (b) The administrative regulation shall require that the handgun's registration
26 information be updated upon any transfer of ownership of the handgun.

27 (c) The Department of Kentucky State Police may establish a fee for

1 applications for a license sufficient to cover the costs of administering the
2 program.

3 (d) Persons registering a handgun under this subsection shall be given the
4 option of deciding whether the registration shall be public or private. If the
5 registration is private, the record shall not be a public record under the
6 Kentucky Open Records Act, KRS 61.870 to 61.884.

7 (e) Any person who possesses an unregistered handgun in violation of the
8 administrative regulation promulgated under this subsection shall be guilty
9 of a Class A misdemeanor.

10 (3) (a) The Department of Kentucky State Police shall promulgate an
11 administrative regulation for the licensure of persons to possess an assault
12 weapon or a large-capacity ammunition-feeding device in the
13 Commonwealth of Kentucky. The administrative regulation shall prohibit
14 the possession of an assault weapon or a large-capacity ammunition-
15 feeding device by a person in Kentucky unless the person holds a license or
16 falls within an exemption that the Department of Kentucky State Police may
17 create in the administrative regulation. The license shall be available to
18 persons who are at least twenty-one (21) years old or have been honorably
19 discharged from the Armed Forces of the United States, meet the eligibility
20 criteria established by the department, and are not otherwise prohibited by
21 state or federal law from possessing an assault weapon or a large-capacity
22 ammunition-feeding device.

23 (b) The Department of Kentucky State Police may establish a fee for
24 applications for a license sufficient to cover the costs of administering the
25 program.

26 (c) Licenses issued under this subsection shall be effective for no longer than
27 five (5) years.

1 (d) Persons receiving a license under this subsection shall be given the option
2 of deciding whether the license shall be public or private. If the registration
3 is private, the record shall not be a public record under the Kentucky Open
4 Records Act, KRS 61.870 to 61.884.

5 (e) Any person who possesses an assault weapon or a large-capacity
6 ammunition-feeding device in violation of the administrative regulation
7 promulgated under this subsection shall be guilty of a Class D felony.

8 (4) (a) The Department of Kentucky State Police shall promulgate an
9 administrative regulation for the registration of assault weapons or large-
10 capacity ammunition-feeding devices in Kentucky. The administrative
11 regulation shall prohibit the possession of an unregistered assault weapon
12 or a large-capacity ammunition-feeding device by a person in Kentucky
13 unless the assault weapon or large-capacity ammunition-feeding device
14 falls within an exemption that the Department of Kentucky State Police may
15 create in the administrative regulation.

16 (b) The administrative regulation shall require that the assault weapon or
17 large-capacity ammunition-feeding device registration information be
18 updated upon any transfer of ownership of the assault weapon or large-
19 capacity ammunition-feeding device.

23 (d) Persons registering an assault weapon or large-capacity ammunition-

1 (e) Any person who possesses an unregistered assault weapon or large-capacity
2 ammunition-feeding device in violation of the administrative regulation
3 promulgated under this subsection shall be guilty of a Class D felony.

4 (5) (a) The Department of Kentucky State Police shall promulgate an
5 administrative regulation establishing a sales log-keeping requirement for
6 firearms dealers and ammunition sellers operating in Kentucky that sell
7 handguns, ammunition for handguns, assault weapons, ammunition for
8 assault weapons, large-capacity ammunition-feeding devices, or
9 ammunition for large-capacity ammunition-feeding devices.

10 (b) 1. The administrative regulation may require that the log be kept in
11 electronic format and transmitted to the department at regular
12 intervals.

13 2. The administrative regulation may require the Department of
14 Kentucky State Police or seller to require the purchaser to produce a
15 government-issued photo identification, which the dealer or seller
16 shall record in the log.

17 (c) By July 1, 2024 the log shall be required to operate in real time and shall
18 query the records of the department prior to the completion of a sale,
19 including sales, exchanges, or transfers pursuant to Section 2 of this Act, to
20 determine whether the purchaser has a current, valid license to possess that
21 type of firearm or a license for the type of firearm for which the
22 ammunition is being purchased.

23 (d) Records kept in the sales log shall be open to inspection by any peace officer
24 acting on official business.

25 (e) Any firearms dealer who violates the administrative regulation promulgated
26 under this subsection shall be guilty of a Class B misdemeanor.

27 ➔Section 16. KRS 532.025 is amended to read as follows:

1 (1) (a) Upon conviction of a defendant in cases where the death penalty may be
2 imposed, a hearing shall be conducted. In such hearing, the judge shall hear
3 additional evidence in extenuation, mitigation, and aggravation of
4 punishment, including the record of any prior criminal convictions and pleas
5 of guilty or pleas of nolo contendere of the defendant, or the absence of any
6 prior conviction and pleas; provided, however, that only ~~that~~^{such} evidence
7 in aggravation as the state has made known to the defendant prior to his or
8 her trial shall be admissible. Subject to the Kentucky Rules of Evidence,
9 juvenile court records of adjudications of guilt of a child for an offense that
10 would be a felony if committed by an adult shall be admissible in court at any
11 time the child is tried as an adult, or after the child becomes an adult, at any
12 subsequent criminal trial relating to that same person. Juvenile court records
13 made available pursuant to this section may be used for impeachment
14 purposes during a criminal trial and may be used during the sentencing phase
15 of a criminal trial; however, the fact that a juvenile has been adjudicated
16 delinquent of an offense that would be a felony if the child had been an adult
17 shall not be used in finding the child to be a persistent felony offender based
18 upon that adjudication. Release of the child's treatment, medical, mental, or
19 psychological records is prohibited unless presented as evidence in Circuit

- 10 4. The offender committed the offense of murder for himself, herself, or
11 another, for the purpose of receiving money or any other thing of
12 monetary value, or for other profit;
- 13 5. The offense of murder was committed by a person who was a prisoner
14 and the victim was a prison employee engaged at the time of the act in
15 the performance of his or her duties;
- 16 6. The offender's act or acts of killing were intentional and resulted in

3 life without benefit of probation or parole until the defendant has served a minimum

14 (1) Except as provided in KRS 527.020, nothing contained in KRS 237.109 or 237.110
15 shall be construed to limit, restrict, or prohibit in any manner~~[the right of a college,~~
16 ~~university, or any postsecondary education facility, including technical schools and~~
17 ~~community colleges, to control the possession of deadly weapons on any property~~
18 ~~owned or controlled by them or]~~ the right of a unit of state, city, county, urban-
19 county, or charter county government to prohibit the carrying of concealed deadly
20 weapons in that portion of a building actually owned, leased, or occupied by that
21 unit of government.

22 member of a peer support counseling program, or the supervisor of a peer
23 support specialist;

24 (b) "Peer support counseling program" means a program provided by a public

1 through a peer support counseling program between a peer support specialist

- 20 3. Serves as a certified telecommunicator as provided by KRS 15.560 to

24 (2) Any public agency may create and design a peer support counseling program to
25 provide support to public safety employees who have been in or exposed to an
