AN ACT

To repeal section 67.1461, RSMo, and section 67.1421 as enacted by house bill no. 1606, one hundred first general assembly, second regular session, and section 67.1421 as enacted by senate bills nos. 153 & 97, one hundred first general assembly, first regular session, and to enact in lieu thereof three new sections relating to an entertainment district.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the state of Missouri, as follows:

Section A. Section 67.1461, RSMo, and section 67.1421 as enacted by house bill no. 1606, one hundred first general assembly, second regular session, and section 67.1421 as enacted by senate bills nos. 153 & 97, one hundred first general assembly, first regular session, are repealed and three new sections enacted in lieu thereof, to be known as sections 5 67.1421, 67.1461, and 67.1505, to read as follows:

	[67.1421. 1. Upon receipt of a proper petition filed with its municipal
2	elerk, the governing body of the municipality in which the proposed district is
3	located shall hold a public hearing in accordance with section 67.1431 and
4	may adopt an ordinance to establish the proposed district.
5	2. A petition is proper if, based on the tax records of the county clerk,
6	or the collector of revenue if the district is located in a city not within a county,
7	as of the time of filing the petition with the municipal clerk, it meets the
8	following requirements:
9	(1) It has been signed by property owners collectively owning more
10	than fifty percent by assessed value of the real property within the boundaries
11	of the proposed district;
12	(2) It has been signed by more than fifty percent per capita of all
13	owners of real property within the boundaries of the proposed district; and
14	(3) It contains the following information:

43	twenty-seven years from the adoption of the ordinance establishing the district
44	unless the municipality extends the length of time under section 67.1481;

46	taxes in the county seat of a county of the first classification without a charter
47	form of government containing a population of at least two hundred thousand,
48	that may be submitted to the qualified voters for approval;

86	(5) Alternatively, the governing body of any home rule city with more
87	than four hundred thousand inhabitants and located in more than one county
88	may file a petition to initiate the process to establish a district in the portion of
89	the city located in any county of the first classification with more than two
90	hundred thousand but fewer than two hundred sixty thousand inhabitants
91	containing the information required in subdivision (3) of this subsection;
92	provided that the only funding methods for the services and improvements will
93	be a real property tax.
94	3. Upon receipt of a petition the municipal clerk shall, within a
95	reasonable time not to exceed ninety days after receipt of the petition, review
96	and determine whether the petition substantially complies with the
97	requirements of subsection 2 of this section. In the event the municipal
98	elerk receives a petition which does not meet the requirements of subsection 2
99	of this section, the municipal clerk shall, within a reasonable time, return the
100	petition to the submitting party by hand delivery, first class mail, postage
101	prepaid or other efficient means of return and shall specify which requirements
102	have not been met.

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4. After the close of the public hearing required pursuant to subsection 1 of this section, the governing body of the municipality may adopt an ordinance approving the petition and establishing a district as set forth in the petition and may determine, if requested in the petition, whether the district, or any legally described portion thereof, constitutes a blighted area. If the petition was filed by the governing body of a municipality pursuant to subdivision (5) of subsection 2 of this section, after the close of the public hearing required pursuant to subsection 1 of this section, the petition may be approved by the governing body and an election shall be called pursuant to section 67.1422.

113 5. Amendments to a petition may be made which do not change the 114 proposed boundaries of the proposed district if an amended petition meeting 115 the requirements of subsection 2 of this section is filed with the municipal 116 elerk at the following times and the following requirements have been met:

117 (1) At any time prior to the close of the public hearing required 118 pursuant to subsection 1 of this section; provided that, notice of the contents of 119 the amended petition is given at the public hearing;

120 (2) At any time after the public hearing and prior to the adoption of an 121 ordinance establishing the proposed district; provided that, notice of the 122 amendments to the petition is given by publishing the notice in a newspaper of 123 general circulation within the municipality and by sending the notice via 124 registered certified United States mail with a return receipt attached to the 125 address of record of each owner of record of real property within the 126 boundaries of the proposed district per the tax records of the county clerk, or 127 the collector of revenue if the district is located in a city not within a county. 128 Such notice shall be published and mailed not less than ten days prior to the 129 adoption of the ordinance establishing the district. Such notice shall also be 130 sent to the Missouri department of revenue, which shall publish such notice on 131 its website: 132

(3) At any time after the adoption of any ordinance establishing the district a public hearing on the amended petition is held and notice of the public hearing is given in the manner provided in section 67.1431 and the governing body of the municipality in which the district is located adopts an ordinance approving the amended petition after the public hearing is held.

137 6. Upon the creation of a district, the municipal clerk shall report in 138 writing the creation of such district to the Missouri department of economic 139 development and the state auditor.

7. (1) The governing body of the municipality or county establishing a district or the governing body of such district shall, as soon as is practicable, submit the following information to the state auditor and the department of revenue:

144 (a) A description of the boundaries of such district as well as the rate of property tax or sales tax levied in such district;

146 (b) Any amendments made to the boundaries of a district or the tax 147 rates levied in such district; and

(c) The date on which the district is to expire unless sooner terminated.

149 (2) The governing body of a community improvement district established on or after August 28, 2022, shall not order any assessment to be 150

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151made on any real property located within a district and shall not levy any152property or sales tax until the information required by paragraph (a) of153subdivision (1) of this subsection has been submitted.]

67.1421. 1. Upon receipt of a proper petition filed with its municipal clerk, the 2 governing body of the municipality in which the proposed district is located shall hold a 3 public hearing in accordance with section 67.1431 and may adopt an ordinance to establish 4 the proposed district.

5 2. A petition is proper if, based on the tax records of the county clerk, or the collector 6 of revenue if the district is located in a city not within a county, as of the time of filing the 7 petition with the municipal clerk, it meets the following requirements:

8 (1) It has been signed by property owners collectively owning more than fifty percent
9 by assessed value of the real property within the boundaries of the proposed district;

10 (2) It has been signed by more than fifty percent per capita of all owners of real 11 property within the boundaries of the proposed district; and

Upon receipt of a petition the municipal clerk shall, within a reasonable time not to 97 exceed ninety days after receipt of the petition, review and determine whether the petition substantially complies with the requirements of subsection 2 of this section. In the event the 98 99 municipal clerk receives a petition which does not meet the requirements of subsection 2 of 100 this section, the municipal clerk shall, within a reasonable time, return the petition to the 101 submitting party by hand delivery, first class mail, postage prepaid or other efficient means of 102 return and shall specify which requirements have not been met. 103 4. After the close of the public hearing required pursuant to subsection 1 of this

104 section, the governing body of the municipality may adopt an ordinance approving the 105 petition and establishing a district as set forth in the petition and may determine, if requested 106 in the petition, whether the district, or any legally described portion thereof, constitutes a

public hearing;

118 (2) At any time after the public hearing and prior to the adoption of an ordinance 119 establishing the proposed district; provided that, notice of the amendments to the petition is 120 given by publishing the notice in a newspaper of general circulation within the municipality 121 and by sending the notice via registered certified United States mail with a return receipt 122 attached to the address of record of each owner of record of real property within the 123 boundaries of the proposed district per the tax records of the county clerk, or the collector of 124 revenue if the district is located in a city not within a county. Such notice shall be published 125 and mailed not less than ten days prior to the adoption of the ordinance establishing the 126 district;

127 (3) At any time after the adoption of any ordinance establishing the district a public 128 hearing on the amended petition is held and notice of the public hearing is given in the 129 manner provided in section 67.1431 and the governing body of the municipality in which the 130 district is located adopts an ordinance approving the amended petition after the public hearing 131 is held.

132 6. Upon the creation of a district, the municipal clerk shall report in writing the133 creation of such district to the Missouri department of economic development and the state134 auditor.

67.1461. 1. Each district shall have all the powers, except to the extent any such
power has been limited by the petition approved by the governing body of the municipality to
establish the district, necessary to carry out and effectuate the purposes and provisions of
sections 67.1401 to 67.1571 including, but not limited to, the following:

5 (1) To adopt, amend, and repeal bylaws, not inconsistent with sections 67.1401 to 6 67.1571, necessary or convenient to carry out the provisions of sections 67.1401 to 67.1571; 7 (2) To sue and be sued;

8 (3) To make and enter into contracts and other instruments, with public and private 9 entities, necessary or convenient to exercise its powers and carry out its duties pursuant to 10 sections 67.1401 to 67.1571;

11 (4) To accept grants, guarantees and donations of property, labor, services, or other 12 things of value from any public or private source;

13 (5) To employ or contract for such managerial, engineering, legal, technical, clerical, 14 accounting, or other assistance as it deems advisable;

15 (6) To acquire by purchase, lease, gift, grant, bequest, devise, or otherwise, any real 16 property within its boundaries, personal property, or any interest in such property;

17 (7) To sell, lease, exchange, transfer, assign, mortgage, pledge, hypothecate, or 18 otherwise encumber or dispose of any real or personal property or any interest in such 19 property;

20 (8) To levy and collect special assessments and taxes as provided in sections 67.1401 21 to 67.1571. However, no such assessments or taxes shall be levied on any property exempt 22 from taxation pursuant to subdivision (5) of section 137.100. Those exempt pursuant to 23 subdivision (5) of section 137.100 may voluntarily participate in the provisions of sections 67.1401 to 67.1571; 24

25 (9) If the district is a political subdivision, to levy real property taxes and business license taxes in the county seat of a county of the first classification containing a population 26 27 of at least two hundred thousand, as provided in sections 67.1401 to 67.1571. However, no 28 such assessments or taxes shall be levied on any property exempt from taxation pursuant to 29 subdivisions (2) and (5) of section 137.100. Those exempt pursuant to subdivisions (2) and (5) of section 137.100 may voluntarily participate in the provisions of sections 67.1401 to 30 31 67.1571;

32 (10) If the district is a political subdivision, to levy sales taxes pursuant to sections 67.1401 to 67.1571; 33

34 (11) To fix, charge, and collect fees, rents, and other charges for use of any of the 35 following:

(a) The district's real property, except for public rights-of-way for utilities;

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(b) The district's personal property, except in a city not within a county; or

38 (c) Any of the district's interests in such real or personal property, except for public 39 rights-of-way for utilities;

40 (12) To borrow money from any public or private source and issue obligations and 41 provide security for the repayment of the same as provided in sections 67.1401 to 67.1571; 42

(13) To loan money as provided in sections 67.1401 to 67.1571;

43 (14) To make expenditures, create reserve funds, and use its revenues as necessary to carry out its powers or duties and the provisions and purposes of sections 67.1401 to 67.1571; 44

(15) To enter into one or more agreements with the municipality for the purpose of
abating any public nuisance within the boundaries of the district including, but not limited to,
the stabilization, repair or maintenance or demolition and removal of buildings or structures,
provided that the municipality has declared the existence of a public nuisance;

49 (16) Within its boundaries, to provide assistance to or to construct, reconstruct, 50 install, repair, maintain, and equip any of the following public improvements:

51 (a) Pedestrian or shopping malls and plazas;

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(a) Pedestrian or snopping mails and plazas;(b) Parks, lawns, trees, and any other landscape;

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(c) Convention centers, arenas, aquariums, aviaries, and meeting facilities;

(d) Sidewalks, streets, alleys, bridges, ramps, tunnels, overpasses and underpasses,
traffic signs and signals, utilities, drainage, water, storm and sewer systems, and other site
improvements;

57 (e) Parking lots, garages, or other facilities;

B (f) Lakes, dams, and waterways;

59 (g) Streetscape, lighting, benches or other seating furniture, trash receptacles, 60 marquees, awnings, canopies, walls, and barriers;

61 (h) Telephone and information booths, bus stop and other shelters, rest rooms, and 62 kiosks;

63 (i) Paintings, murals, display cases, sculptures, and fountains;

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(j) Music, news, and child-care facilities; and

65 (k) Any other useful, necessary, or desired public improvement specified in the 66 petition or any amendment;

67 (17) To dedicate to the municipality, with the municipality's consent, streets,
68 sidewalks, parks, and other real property and improvements located within its boundaries for
69 public use;

(18) Within its boundaries and with the municipality's consent, to prohibit or restrict
vehicular and pedestrian traffic and vendors on streets, alleys, malls, bridges, ramps,
sidewalks, and tunnels and to provide the means for access by emergency vehicles to or in
such areas;

(19) Within its boundaries, to operate or to contract for the provision of music, news,
 child-care, or parking facilities, and buses, minibuses, or other modes of transportation;

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(20) Within its boundaries, to lease space for sidewalk café tables and chairs;

(21) Within its boundaries, to provide or contract for the provision of securitypersonnel, equipment, or facilities for the protection of property and persons;

79 (22) Within its boundaries, to provide or contract for cleaning, maintenance, and 80 other services to public and private property;

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81 (23) To produce and promote any tourism, recreational or cultural activity or special 82 event in the district by, but not limited to, advertising, decoration of any public place in the 83 district, promotion of such activity and special events, and furnishing music in any public 84 place;

85 (24) To support business activity and economic development in the district including, 86 but not limited to, the promotion of business activity, development and retention, and the 87 recruitment of developers and businesses;

88 (25) To provide or support training programs for employees of businesses within the89 district;

(26) To provide refuse collection and disposal services within the district;

91 (27) To contract for or conduct economic, planning, marketing or other studies;

92 (28) To repair, restore, or maintain any abandoned cemetery on public or private land 93 within the district; and

94 (29) To partner with a telecommunications company or broadband service provider in 95 order to construct or improve telecommunications facilities which shall be wholly owned and 96 operated by the telecommunications company or broadband service provider, as the terms "telecommunications company" and "telecommunications facilities" are defined in section 97 98 386.020 and subject to the provisions of section 392.410, that are in an unserved or underserved area, as defined in section 620.2450. Before any facilities are improved or 99 100 constructed as a result of this section, the area shall be certified as unserved or underserved by 101 the director of broadband development within the department of economic development;

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(30) To carry out any other powers set forth in sections 67.1401 to 67.1571.

103 2. Each district which is located in a blighted area or which includes a blighted area 104 shall have the following additional powers:

105 (1) Within its blighted area, to contract with any private property owner to demolish 106 and remove, renovate, reconstruct, or rehabilitate any building or structure owned by such 107 private property owner; and

108 (2) To expend its revenues or loan its revenues pursuant to a contract entered into 109 pursuant to this subsection, provided that the governing body of the municipality has 110 determined that the action to be taken pursuant to such contract is reasonably anticipated to 111 remediate the blighting conditions and will serve a public purpose.

1123. Each district that is an entertainment district as defined in section 67.1421113shall have the following additional powers within its boundaries:

(1) To restrict or prohibit the carrying of weapons or firearms in designated
 restricted areas including, but not limited to, parks, public events, and other public
 spaces within the boundaries of the district;

117 (2) To promulgate and enforce rules relating to curfews and the presence and 118 activities of unaccompanied minors under the age of eighteen in public spaces during 119 specified hours unless accompanied by a parent or guardian; and

(3) To hire and train public safety and security personnel to enforce the laws of 120 121 the municipality and rules of the district.

122 4. Each district shall annually reimburse the municipality for the reasonable and 123 actual expenses incurred by the municipality to establish such district and review annual 124 budgets and reports of such district required to be submitted to the municipality; provided 125 that, such annual reimbursement shall not exceed one and one-half percent of the revenues 126 collected by the district in such year.

127 [4.] 5. Nothing in sections 67.1401 to 67.1571 shall be construed to delegate to any 128 district any sovereign right of municipalities to promote order, safety, health, morals, and 129 general welfare of the public, except those such police powers, if any, expressly delegated pursuant to sections 67.1401 to 67.1571. 130

131 [5.] 6. The governing body of the municipality establishing the district shall not 132 decrease the level of publicly funded services in the district existing prior to the creation of 133 the district or transfer the financial burden of providing the services to the district unless the 134 services at the same time are decreased throughout the municipality, nor shall the governing 135 body discriminate in the provision of the publicly funded services between areas included in 136 such district and areas not so included.

137 [6-] 7. All construction contracts entered into after August 28, 2021, in excess of five 138 thousand dollars between a district that has adopted a sales tax and any private person, firm, 139 or corporation shall be competitively bid and shall be awarded to the lowest and best bidder. 140 Notice of the letting of the contracts shall be given in the manner provided by section 8.250.

67.1505. 1. As used in this section, the following terms mean:

2 (1) "Entertainment tourism", activities, services, and experiences designed for leisure and enjoyment centered on athletic, recreational, and cultural events, 3 4 attractions, and enrichment, sponsored by any public or private entity, the provision and enhancement of public safety and the provision of financial assistance to attract 5 sporting events, recreational, entertainment, or other meeting activities, either 6 7 professional or amateur, commercial or private;

8 "State department", the office of administration and each department (2) 9 created under Article IV, Section 12 of the Constitution of Missouri, excluding the statewide elected officials listed in such section. 10

11 The state of Missouri hereby acknowledges the vital role entertainment 2. tourism plays in fostering the state's economic growth, providing substantial revenue, 12 13 creating jobs, and enhancing the state's cultural and social vitality.

14 **3.** (1) Each state department may, upon such terms and with reasonable 15 consideration as such state departments may determine, expend funds for the purpose 16 of promoting, developing, and supporting entertainment tourism within any district 17 designated as an entertainment district under section 67.1421 and for which application 18 is made and approved by the department of economic development no later than August 19 **28**, 2027.

20 (2) Any annual expenditure by a state department for entertainment tourism 21 shall be limited to a portion of tax revenues derived directly or indirectly from any such 22 promotion, development, and support of entertainment tourism supported by such 23 annual expenditure within such designated entertainment district, as stated in an 24 agreement entered into between the district and the state department, subject to the 25 following:

(a) The term of state appropriations under any such agreement shall not exceed
 twenty-seven years;

(b) The annual amount of the state appropriations authorized under this section
shall not exceed two million five hundred thousand dollars per year for any fiscal year
ending on or before June 30, 2031, and four million five hundred thousand dollars per
year for any fiscal year thereafter. No such appropriation shall be made prior to July 1,
2026;

33 (c) Any such promotion, development, and support of entertainment tourism 34 shall be determined to produce a positive net fiscal impact for the state over the term of 35 such agreement, with such public or private assurances as the director of the 36 department of economic development may reasonably require; and

37 (d) The director of the department of economic development shall make an 38 annual written report on behalf of such department to the governor and the general 39 assembly within ninety days of the end of each fiscal year detailing whether such 40 promotion, development, and support of entertainment tourism produced a positive net 41 fiscal impact for the state in the prior fiscal year and projecting the overall net fiscal 42 impact to the state over the term of such agreement.

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
