

HOUSE AMENDMENTS TO HOUSE BILL 2302

1 On page 1 of the printed bill, line 2, after “192.579,” insert “414.025, 414.651.”

2 In line 3, after “743.847” insert “and sections 14 and 64, chapter 602, Oregon Laws 2011” and
3 after “414.727” insert “and section 60, chapter 602, Oregon Laws 2011”.

4 Delete lines 5 through 31 and delete pages 2 through 8 and insert:

5 “**SECTION 1.** Section 14, chapter 602, Oregon Laws 2011, as amended by section 2, chapter 8,
6 Oregon Laws 2012, is amended to read:

7 “**Sec. 14.** (1)(a) [*Notwithstanding ORS 414.631 and 414.651, in any area of the state where a co-*
8 *ordinated care organization has not been certified,*] The Oregon Health Authority shall continue to
9 contract with one or more prepaid managed care health services organizations, as defined in ORS
10 [414.736] **414.025**, that [*serve the area and that*] are in compliance with contractual obligations owed
11 to the state or local government **on the effective date of this 2015 Act and that serve:**

12 “**(A) A geographic area of the state that a coordinated care organization has not been**
13 **certified to serve; or**

14 “**(B) Individuals described in ORS 414.631 (2), (3) and (4).**

15 “**(b) Contracts authorized by this subsection are not subject to ORS chapters 279A and**
16 **279B, except ORS 279A.250 to 279A.290 and 279B.235.**

17 “(2) Prepaid managed care health services organizations contracting with the authority under
18 this section are subject to the applicable requirements for, and are permitted to exercise the rights
19 of, coordinated care organizations under ORS 414.153, 414.625, 414.635, 414.638, 414.651, 414.655,
20 414.679, 414.712, 414.728, 414.743, 414.746, 414.760, 416.510 to 416.610, 441.094, 442.464, 655.515,
21 659.830 and 743.847.

22 “[3] *The authority may amend contracts that are in place on July 1, 2011, to allow prepaid man-*
23 *aged care health services organizations that meet the criteria adopted by the authority under ORS*
24 *414.625 to become coordinated care organizations.]*

25 “[4] *The authority shall continue to renew the contracts of prepaid managed care health services*
26 *organizations that have a contract with the authority on July 1, 2011, until the earlier of the date the*
27 *prepaid managed care health services organization becomes a coordinated care organization or July*
28 *1, 2014. Contracts with prepaid managed care health services organizations must terminate no later*
29 *than July 1, 2017.]*

30 “[5] *The authority shall continue to renew contracts or ensure that counties renew contracts with*
31 *providers of residential chemical dependency treatment until the provider enters into a contract with a*
32 *coordinated care organization but no later than July 1, 2013.]*

33 “[6] **(3)** [*Notwithstanding ORS 414.625 (2)(g) and 414.655 (2), the authority shall allow for a pe-*
34 *riod of transition*] To **facilitate** the full adoption of health information technology by coordinated
35 care organizations and patient centered primary care homes[.], the authority shall explore options

1 for assisting providers and coordinated care organizations in funding their use of health information
2 technology.

3 “**SECTION 2.** Section 64, chapter 602, Oregon Laws 2011, as amended by section 70, chapter
4 602, Oregon Laws 2011, and section 23, chapter 8, Oregon Laws 2012, is amended to read:

5 “**Sec. 64.** (1) ORS 414.705 is repealed.

6 “(2) Sections 13 and 17, chapter 602, Oregon Laws 2011, are repealed January 2, 2014.

7 “(3) ORS 414.610, [414.630, 414.640,] **414.615, 414.618**, 414.736, 414.738, 414.739 and 414.740 are
8 repealed July 1, 2017.

9 “[4] *Section 14, chapter 602, Oregon Laws 2011, as amended by section 2 of this 2012 Act, is re-*
10 *pealed July 1, 2017.*]

11 “**SECTION 3.** ORS 192.493 is amended to read:

12 “192.493. A record of an agency of the executive department as defined in ORS 174.112 that
13 contains the following information is a public record subject to inspection under ORS 192.420 and
14 is not exempt from disclosure under ORS 192.501 or 192.502 except to the extent that the record
15 discloses information about an individual’s health or is proprietary to a person:

16 “(1) The amounts determined by an independent actuary retained by the agency to cover the
17 costs of providing each of the following health services under ORS 414.631, 414.651 and 414.688 to
18 414.745 for the six months preceding the report:

19 “(a) Inpatient hospital services;

20 “(b) Outpatient hospital services;

21 “(c) Laboratory and X-ray services;

22 “(d) Physician and other licensed practitioner services;

23 “(e) Prescription drugs;

24 “(f) Dental services;

25 “(g) Vision services;

26 “(h) Mental health services;

27 “(i) Chemical dependency services;

28 “(j) Durable medical equipment and supplies; and

29 “(k) Other health services provided under a coordinated care organization contract under ORS
30 414.651 or a contract with a prepaid managed care health services organization, **as defined in ORS**
31 **414.025**;

32 “(2) The amounts the agency and each contractor have paid under each coordinated care or-
33 ganization contract under ORS 414.651 or prepaid managed care health services organization con-
34 tract for administrative costs and the provision of each of the health services described in
35 subsection (1) of this section for the six months preceding the report;

36 “(3) Any adjustments made to the amounts reported under this section to account for geographic
37 or other differences in providing the health services; and

38 “(4) The numbers of individuals served under each coordinated care organization contract or
39 prepaid managed care health services organization contract, listed by category of individual.

40 “**SECTION 4.** ORS 192.579 is amended to read:

41 “192.579. (1) As used in this section, ‘entity’ means a health care provider, **a coordinated care**
42 **organization, as defined in ORS 414.025** or a prepaid managed care health services organization,
43 as defined in ORS [414.736] **414.025**, that provides health care to an individual, if the care is paid
44 for by a state health plan.

45 “(2) Notwithstanding ORS 179.505, an entity may disclose the identity of an individual who re-

1 ceives health care from the entity without obtaining an authorization from the individual, or a per-
2 sonal representative of the individual, to another entity for the purpose of coordinating the health
3 care and treatment provided to the individual by either entity.

4 “**SECTION 5.** ORS 414.025 is amended to read:

5 “414.025. As used in this chapter and ORS chapters 411 and 413, unless the context or a spe-
6 cially applicable statutory definition requires otherwise:

7 “(1)(a) ‘Alternative payment methodology’ means a payment other than a fee-for-services pay-
8 ment, used by coordinated care organizations as compensation for the provision of integrated and
9 coordinated health care and services.

10 “(b) ‘Alternative payment methodology’ includes, but is not limited to:

11 “(A) Shared savings arrangements;

12 “(B) Bundled payments; and

13 “(C) Payments based on episodes.

14 “(2) ‘Category of aid’ means assistance provided by the Oregon Supplemental Income Program,
15 aid granted under ORS 412.001 to 412.069 and 418.647 or federal Supplemental Security Income
16 payments.

17 “(3) ‘Community health worker’ means an individual who:

18 “(a) Has expertise or experience in public health;

19 “(b) Works in an urban or rural community, either for pay or as a volunteer in association with
20 a local health care system;

21 “(c) To the extent practicable, shares ethnicity, language, socioeconomic status and life experi-
22 ences with the residents of the community where the worker serves;

23 “(d) Assists members of the community to improve their health and increases the capacity of the
24 community to meet the health care needs of its residents and achieve wellness;

25 “(e) Provides health education and information that is culturally appropriate to the individuals
26 being served;

27 “(f) Assists community residents in receiving the care they need;

28 “(g) May give peer counseling and guidance on health behaviors; and

29 “(h) May provide direct services such as first aid or blood pressure screening.

30 “(4) ‘Coordinated care organization’ means an organization meeting criteria adopted by the
31 Oregon Health Authority under ORS 414.625.

32 “(5) ‘Dually eligible for Medicare and Medicaid’ means, with respect to eligibility for enrollment
33 in a coordinated care organization, that an individual is eligible for health services funded by Title
34 XIX of the Social Security Act and is:

35 “(a) Eligible for or enrolled in Part A of Title XVIII of the Social Security Act; or

36 “(b) Enrolled in Part B of Title XVIII of the Social Security Act.

37 “(6) ‘Global budget’ means a total amount established prospectively by the Oregon Health Au-
38 thority to be paid to a coordinated care organization for the delivery of, management of, access to
39 and quality of the health care delivered to members of the coordinated care organization.

40 “(7) ‘Health services’ means at least so much of each of the following as are funded by the
41 Legislative Assembly based upon the prioritized list of health services compiled by the Health Evi-
42 dence Review Commission under ORS 414.690:

43 “(a) Services required by federal law to be included in the state’s medical assistance program
44 in order for the program to qualify for federal funds;

45 “(b) Services provided by a physician as defined in ORS 677.010, a nurse practitioner certified

1 under ORS 678.375 or other licensed practitioner within the scope of the practitioner's practice as
2 defined by state law, and ambulance services;

3 "(c) Prescription drugs;

4 "(d) Laboratory and X-ray services;

5 "(e) Medical equipment and supplies;

6 "(f) Mental health services;

7 "(g) Chemical dependency services;

8 "(h) Emergency dental services;

9 "(i) Nonemergency dental services;

10 "(j) Provider services, other than services described in paragraphs (a) to (i), (k), (L) and (m) of
11 this subsection, defined by federal law that may be included in the state's medical assistance pro-
12 gram;

13 "(k) Emergency hospital services;

14 "(L) Outpatient hospital services; and

15 "(m) Inpatient hospital services.

16 "(8) 'Income' has the meaning given that term in ORS 411.704.

17 "(9) 'Investments and savings' means cash, securities as defined in ORS 59.015, negotiable in-
18 struments as defined in ORS 73.0104 and such similar investments or savings as the department or
19 the authority may establish by rule that are available to the applicant or recipient to contribute
20 toward meeting the needs of the applicant or recipient.

21 "(10) 'Medical assistance' means so much of the medical, mental health, preventive, supportive,
22 palliative and remedial care and services as may be prescribed by the authority according to the
23 standards established pursuant to ORS 414.065, including premium assistance and payments made for
24 services provided under an insurance or other contractual arrangement and money paid directly to
25 the recipient for the purchase of health services and for services described in ORS 414.710.

26 "(11) 'Medical assistance' includes any care or services for any individual who is a patient in
27 a medical institution or any care or services for any individual who has attained 65 years of age
28 or is under 22 years of age, and who is a patient in a private or public institution for mental dis-
29 eases. 'Medical assistance' does not include care or services for an inmate in a nonmedical public
30 institution.

31 "(12) 'Patient centered primary care home' means a health care team or clinic that is organized
32 in accordance with the standards established by the Oregon Health Authority under ORS 414.655
33 and that incorporates the following core attributes:

34 "(a) Access to care;

35 "(b) Accountability to consumers and to the community;

36 "(c) Comprehensive whole person care;

37 "(d) Continuity of care;

38 "(e) Coordination and integration of care; and

39 "(f) Person and family centered care.

40 "(13) 'Peer wellness specialist' means an individual who is responsible for assessing mental
41 health service and support needs of the individual's peers through community outreach, assisting
42 individuals with access to available services and resources, addressing barriers to services and
43 providing education and information about available resources and mental health issues in order to
44 reduce stigmas and discrimination toward consumers of mental health services and to provide direct
45 services to assist individuals in creating and maintaining recovery, health and wellness.

1 “(14) ‘Person centered care’ means care that:
2 “(a) Reflects the individual patient’s strengths and preferences;
3 “(b) Reflects the clinical needs of the patient as identified through an individualized assessment;
4 and
5 “(c) Is based upon the patient’s goals and will assist the patient in achieving the goals.
6 “(15) ‘Personal health navigator’ means an individual who provides information, assistance, tools
7 and support to enable a patient to make the best health care decisions in the patient’s particular
8 circumstances and in light of the patient’s needs, lifestyle, combination of conditions and desired
9 outcomes.
10 “(16) **‘Prepaid managed care health services organization’ means a managed dental care,
11 mental health or chemical dependency organization that contracts with the authority under
12 section 14, chapter 602, Oregon Laws 2011, or with a coordinated care organization on a
13 prepaid capitated basis to provide health services to medical assistance recipients.**
14 “[16] (17) ‘Quality measure’ means the measures and benchmarks identified by the authority
15 in accordance with ORS 414.638.
16 “[17] (18) ‘Resources’ has the meaning given that term in ORS 411.704. For eligibility purposes,
17 ‘resources’ does not include charitable contributions raised by a community to assist with medical
18 expenses.
19 **“SECTION 6.** ORS 414.651 is amended to read:
20 “414.651. (1)(a) The Oregon Health Authority shall use, to the greatest extent possible, coordi-
21 nated care organizations to provide fully integrated physical health services, chemical dependency
22 and mental health services and oral health services. This section, and any contract entered into
23 pursuant to this section, does not affect and may not alter the delivery of Medicaid-funded long term
24 care services.
25 “(b) The authority shall execute contracts with coordinated care organizations that meet the
26 criteria adopted by the authority under ORS 414.625. Contracts under this subsection are not subject
27 to ORS chapters 279A and 279B, except ORS 279A.250 to 279A.290 and 279B.235.
28 “(c) The authority shall establish financial reporting requirements for coordinated care organ-
29 izations. The authority shall prescribe a reporting procedure that elicits sufficiently detailed infor-
30 mation for the authority to assess the financial condition of each coordinated care organization and
31 that:
32 “(A) Enables the authority to verify that the coordinated care organization’s reserves and other
33 financial resources are adequate to ensure against the risk of insolvency; and
34 “(B) Includes information on the three highest executive salary and benefit packages of each
35 coordinated care organization.
36 “(d) The authority shall hold coordinated care organizations, contractors and providers ac-
37 countable for timely submission of outcome and quality data, including but not limited to data de-
38 scribed in ORS 442.466, prescribed by the authority by rule.
39 “(e) The authority shall require compliance with the provisions of paragraphs (c) and (d) of this
40 subsection as a condition of entering into a contract with a coordinated care organization. A coordi-
41 nated care organization, contractor or provider that fails to comply with paragraph (c) or (d) of
42 this subsection may be subject to sanctions, including but not limited to civil penalties, barring any
43 new enrollment in the coordinated care organization and termination of the contract.
44 “(f)(A) The authority shall adopt rules and procedures to ensure that if a rural health clinic
45 provides a health service to a member of a coordinated care organization, and the rural health clinic

1 is not participating in the member's coordinated care organization, the rural health clinic receives
2 total aggregate payments from the member's coordinated care organization, other payers on the
3 claim and the authority that are no less than the amount the rural health clinic would receive in
4 the authority's fee-for-service payment system. The authority shall issue a payment to the rural
5 health clinic in accordance with this subsection within 45 days of receipt by the authority of a
6 completed billing form.

7 "(B) 'Rural health clinic,' as used in this paragraph, shall be defined by the authority by rule
8 and shall conform, as far as practicable or applicable in this state, to the definition of that term in
9 42 U.S.C. 1395x(aa)(2).

10 "(2) The authority may contract with providers other than coordinated care organizations to
11 provide integrated and coordinated health care in areas that are not served by a coordinated care
12 organization or where the organization's provider network is inadequate. Contracts authorized by
13 this subsection are not subject to ORS chapters 279A and 279B, except ORS 279A.250 to 279A.290
14 and 279B.235.

15 "(3) As provided in subsections (1) and (2) of this section, the aggregate expenditures by the
16 authority for health services provided pursuant to ORS 414.631, 414.651 and 414.688 to 414.745 may
17 not exceed the total dollars appropriated for health services under ORS 414.631, 414.651 and 414.688
18 to 414.745.

19 "(4) Actions taken by providers, potential providers, contractors and bidders in specific accord-
20 ance with ORS 414.631, 414.651 and 414.688 to 414.745 **and section 14, chapter 602, Oregon Laws**
21 **2011**, in forming consortiums or in otherwise entering into contracts to provide health care services
22 shall be performed pursuant to state supervision and shall be considered to be conducted at the di-
23 rection of this state, shall be considered to be lawful trade practices and may not be considered to
24 be the transaction of insurance for purposes of the Insurance Code.

25 "(5) Health care providers contracting to provide services under ORS 414.631, 414.651 and
26 414.688 to 414.745 shall advise a patient of any service, treatment or test that is medically necessary
27 but not covered under the contract if an ordinarily careful practitioner in the same or similar
28 community would do so under the same or similar circumstances.

29 "(6) A coordinated care organization shall provide information to a member as prescribed by the
30 authority by rule, including but not limited to written information, within 30 days of enrollment with
31 the coordinated care organization about available providers.

32 "(7) Each coordinated care organization shall work to provide assistance that is culturally and
33 linguistically appropriate to the needs of the member to access appropriate services and participate
34 in processes affecting the member's care and services.

35 "(8) Each coordinated care organization shall provide upon the request of a member or pro-
36 spective member annual summaries of the organization's aggregate data regarding:

37 "(a) Grievances and appeals; and

38 "(b) Availability and accessibility of services provided to members.

39 "(9) A coordinated care organization may not limit enrollment in a geographic area based on the
40 zip code of a member or prospective member.

41 "**SECTION 7.** ORS 414.736 is amended to read:

42 "414.736. As used in [ORS 192.493,] this chapter[, ORS chapter 416 and section 9, chapter 867,
43 Oregon Laws 2009]:

44 "(1) 'Designated area' means a geographic area of the state defined by the Oregon Health Au-
45 thority by rule that is served by a prepaid managed care health services organization.

1 “(2) ‘Fully capitated health plan’ means an organization that contracts with the authority on a
2 prepaid capitated basis under ORS 414.618.

3 “(3) ‘Physician care organization’ means an organization that contracts with the authority on a
4 prepaid capitated basis under ORS 414.618 to provide the health services described in ORS 414.025
5 (7)(b), (c), (d), (e), (f), (g) and (j). A physician care organization may also contract with the authority
6 on a prepaid capitated basis to provide the health services described in ORS 414.025 (7)(k) and (L).

7 “[*(4) ‘Prepaid managed care health services organization’ means a managed physical health,
8 dental, mental health or chemical dependency organization that contracts with the authority on a pre-
9 paid capitated basis under ORS 414.618. A prepaid managed care health services organization may
10 be a dental care organization, fully capitated health plan, physician care organization, mental health
11 organization or chemical dependency organization.*]

12 “**SECTION 8.** ORS 416.510 is amended to read:

13 “416.510. As used in ORS 416.510 to 416.610, unless the context requires otherwise:

14 “(1) ‘Action’ means an action, suit or proceeding.

15 “(2) ‘Alternative payment methodology’ has the meaning given that term in ORS 414.025.

16 “(3) ‘Applicant’ means an applicant for assistance.

17 “(4) ‘Assistance’ means moneys paid by the Department of Human Services to persons directly
18 and moneys paid by the Oregon Health Authority or by a prepaid managed care health services
19 organization or a coordinated care organization for services provided under contract pursuant to
20 ORS 414.651 to others for the benefit of such persons.

21 “(5) ‘Authority’ means the Oregon Health Authority.

22 “(6) ‘Claim’ means a claim of a recipient of assistance for damages for personal injuries against
23 any person or public body, agency or commission other than the State Accident Insurance Fund
24 Corporation or Workers’ Compensation Board.

25 “(7) ‘Compromise’ means a compromise between a recipient and any person or public body,
26 agency or commission against whom the recipient has a claim.

27 “(8) ‘Coordinated care organization’ means an organization that meets the criteria adopted by
28 the authority under ORS 414.625.

29 “(9) ‘Judgment’ means a judgment in any action or proceeding brought by a recipient to enforce
30 the claim of the recipient.

31 “(10) ‘Prepaid managed care health services organization’ [*means a managed health, dental or
32 mental health care organization that contracted with the authority on a prepaid capitated basis. Pre-
33 paid managed care health services organizations may be dental care organizations, fully capitated
34 health plans, mental health organizations or chemical dependency organizations.*] **has the meaning
35 given that term in ORS 414.025.**

36 “(11) ‘Recipient’ means a recipient of assistance.

37 “(12) ‘Settlement’ means a settlement between a recipient and any person or public body, agency
38 or commission against whom the recipient has a claim.

39 “**SECTION 9.** ORS 741.300 is amended to read:

40 “741.300. As used in ORS 741.001 to 741.540:

41 “**(1) ‘Coordinated care organization’ has the meaning given that term in ORS 414.025.**

42 “[*(1) (2) ‘Essential health benefits’ has the meaning given that term in ORS 731.097.*]

43 “[*(2) (3) ‘Health care service contractor’ has the meaning given that term in ORS 750.005.*]

44 “[*(3) (4) ‘Health insurance’ has the meaning given that term in ORS 731.162, excluding disability
45 income insurance.*]

1 “[(4)] (5) ‘Health insurance exchange’ or ‘exchange’ means an American Health Benefit Ex-
2 change as described in 42 U.S.C. 18031, 18032, 18033 and 18041 that is operated by the Oregon
3 Health Insurance Exchange Corporation.

4 “[(5)] (6) ‘Health plan’ means health insurance or health care coverage offered by an insurer.

5 “[(6)] (7) ‘Insurer’ means an insurer as defined in ORS 731.106 that offers health insurance, a
6 health care service contractor, [or] a prepaid managed care health services organization **or a co-
7 ordinated care organization.**

8 “[(7)] (8) ‘Insurance producer’ has the meaning given that term in ORS 731.104.

9 “[(8)] (9) ‘Prepaid managed care health services organization’ has the meaning given that term
10 in ORS [414.736] **414.025.**

11 “[(9)] (10) ‘State program’ means a program providing medical assistance, as defined in ORS
12 414.025, and any health plan offered through the Public Employees’ Benefit Board or the Oregon
13 Educators Benefit Board.

14 “**SECTION 10.** ORS 741.310 is amended to read:

15 “741.310. (1) The following individuals and groups may purchase qualified health plans through
16 the health insurance exchange:

17 “(a) Beginning January 1, 2014:

18 “(A) Individuals and families; and

19 “(B) Employers with no more than 50 employees.

20 “(b) Beginning October 1, 2015, districts and eligible employees of districts that are subject to
21 ORS 243.886, unless their participation is precluded by federal law.

22 “(c) Beginning January 1, 2016, employers with 51 to 100 employees.

23 “(2)(a) Only individuals who purchase health plans through the exchange may be eligible to re-
24 ceive premium tax credits under section 36B of the Internal Revenue Code and reduced cost-sharing
25 under 42 U.S.C. 18071.

26 “(b) Only employers that purchase health plans through the exchange may be eligible to receive
27 small employer health insurance credits under section 45R of the Internal Revenue Code.

28 “(3) Only an insurer that has a certificate of authority to transact insurance in this state and
29 that meets applicable federal requirements for participating in the exchange may offer a qualified
30 health plan through the exchange. Any qualified health plan must be certified under subsection (4)
31 of this section. Prepaid managed care health services organizations **and coordinated care organ-
32 izations** that do not have a certificate of authority to transact insurance may serve only medical
33 assistance recipients through the exchange and may not offer qualified health plans.

34 “(4)(a) The Oregon Health Insurance Exchange Corporation shall adopt by rule uniform re-
35 quirements, standards and criteria for the certification of qualified health plans, including require-
36 ments that a qualified health plan provide, at a minimum, essential health benefits and have
37 acceptable consumer and provider satisfaction ratings.

38 “(b) The corporation may limit the number of qualified health plans that may be offered through
39 the exchange as long as the same limit applies to all insurers.

40 “(5) Notwithstanding subsection (4) of this section, the corporation shall certify as qualified a
41 dental only health plan as permitted by federal law.

42 “(6) The corporation shall establish one streamlined and seamless application and enrollment
43 process for both the exchange and the state medical assistance program.

44 “(7) The corporation, in collaboration with the appropriate state authorities, may establish risk
45 mediation programs within the exchange.

1 “(8) The corporation shall establish by rule a process for certifying insurance producers to fa-
2 cilitate the transaction of insurance through the exchange, in accordance with federal standards and
3 policies.

4 “(9) The corporation shall ensure, as required by federal laws, that an insurer charges the same
5 premiums for plans sold through the exchange as for identical plans sold outside of the exchange.

6 “(10) The corporation is authorized to enter into contracts for the performance of duties, func-
7 tions or operations of the exchange, including but not limited to contracting with:

8 “(a) All insurers that meet the requirements of subsections (3) and (4) of this section, to offer
9 qualified health plans through the exchange; and

10 “(b) Navigators certified by the corporation under ORS 741.002.

11 “(11)(a) The corporation shall consult with stakeholders, including but not limited to represen-
12 tatives of school administrators, school board members, school employees and the Oregon Educators
13 Benefit Board, regarding the plans that may be offered through the exchange to districts and eligible
14 employees of districts under subsection (1)(b) of this section and the insurers that may offer the
15 plans.

16 “(b) The board and the corporation shall each adopt rules to ensure that:
