

HOUSE AMENDMENTS TO HOUSE BILL 4014

2 through 8 and insert “ORS 90.396, 305.620, 316.680, 419C.239, 419C.420, 419C.443, 471.001, 471.775,
3 475.245, 475.752, 475.856, 475.858, 475.860, 475.862, 475.864, 475.898, 475B.015, 475B.063, 475B.070,
4 475B.075, 475B.090, 475B.100, 475B.110, 475B.150, 475B.160, 475B.185, 475B.218, 475B.235, 475B.245,
5 475B.250, 475B.255, 475B.340, 475B.375, 475B.415, 475B.420, 475B.428, 475B.435, 475B.443, 475B.450,
6 475B.705, 475B.710, 475B.760, 475B.800, 809.265 and 813.215 and section 3, chapter 20, Oregon Laws
7 2015; repealing ORS 475B.120, 475B.285 and 811.481 and sections 173 and 175b, chapter 614, Oregon

12 **“(Producers Licensed by the**
13 **Oregon Liquor Control Commission)**
14

15 **“SECTION 1.** ORS 475B.070 is amended to read:

16 “475B.070. (1) The production of marijuana is subject to regulation by the Oregon Liquor Con-
17 trol Commission.

18 “(2) A marijuana producer must have a production license issued by the commission for the
19 premises at which the marijuana is produced. To hold a production license under this section, a
20 marijuana producer:

21 “(a) Must apply for a license in the manner described in ORS 475B.040;

22 “(b) *[Must, until January 1, 2020, provide proof that an applicant listed on an application submit-*
23 *ted under ORS 475B.040 has been a resident of this state for two or more years, and]* Must provide
24 proof that the applicant is 21 years of age or older; and

25 “(c) Must meet the requirements of any rule adopted by the commission under subsection (3) of
26 this section.

27 “(3) The commission shall adopt rules that:

28 “(a) Require a marijuana producer to annually renew a license issued under this section;

29 “(b) Establish application, licensure and renewal of licensure fees for marijuana producers;

30 “(c) Require marijuana produced by marijuana producers to be tested in accordance with ORS
31 475B.555;

32 **“(d) Assist the viability of marijuana producers that are independently owned and oper-**
33 **ated and that are limited in size and revenue with respect to other marijuana producers, by**
34 **minimizing barriers to entry into the regulated system and by expanding, to the extent**
35 **practicable, transportation options that will support their access to the retail market;**

1 “[(d)] (e) Require marijuana producers to submit, at the time of applying for or renewing a li-
2 cense under ORS 475B.040, a report describing the applicant’s or licensee’s electrical or water us-
3 age; and

4 “[e)(A)] (f)(A) Require a marijuana producer to meet any public health and safety standards and
5 industry best practices established by the commission by rule related to:

6 “(i) The production of marijuana; or

7 “(ii) The propagation of immature marijuana plants and the seeds of the plant Cannabis family
8 Cannabaceae.

9 “(B) For purposes of establishing rules under subparagraph (A)(ii) of this paragraph, the com-
10 mission may not limit:

11 “(i) The number of immature marijuana plants that may be possessed by a marijuana producer
12 licensed under this section;

13 “(ii) The size of the grow canopy a marijuana producer licensed under this section uses to grow
14 immature marijuana plants; or

15 “(iii) The weight or size of shipments of immature marijuana plants made by a marijuana pro-
16 ducer licensed under this section.

17 “(4) Fees adopted under subsection (3)(b) of this section:

18 “(a) May not exceed, **together with other fees collected under ORS 475B.010 to 475B.395,**
19 the cost of administering ORS 475B.010 to 475B.395 [*with respect to marijuana producers*];

20 “(b) Shall be in the form of a schedule that imposes a greater fee for premises with more square
21 footage or on which more mature marijuana plants are grown; and

22 “(c) Shall be deposited in the Marijuana Control and Regulation Fund established under ORS
23 475B.240.

25 **“(Processors Licensed by the**
26 **Oregon Liquor Control Commission)**
27

28 “**SECTION 2.** ORS 475B.090 is amended to read:

29 “475B.090. (1) The processing of marijuana items is subject to regulation by the Oregon Liquor
30 Control Commission.

31 “(2) A marijuana processor must have a processor license issued by the commission for the
32 premises at which marijuana items are processed. To hold a processor license under this section, a
33 marijuana processor:

34 “(a) Must apply for a license in the manner described in ORS 475B.040;

35 “(b) [*Must, until January 1, 2020, provide proof that an applicant listed on an application submit-*
36 *ted under ORS 475B.040 has been a resident of this state for two or more years, and*] Must provide
37 proof that the applicant is 21 years of age or older;

38 “(c) If the marijuana processor processes marijuana extracts, may not be located in an area
39 zoned exclusively for residential use; and

40 “(d) Must meet the requirements of any rule adopted by the commission under subsection (3) of
41 this section.

42 “(3) The commission shall adopt rules that:

43 “(a) Require a marijuana processor to annually renew a license issued under this section;

44 “(b) Establish application, licensure and renewal of licensure fees for marijuana processors;

45 “(c) Require marijuana processed by a marijuana processor to be tested in accordance with ORS

1 475B.555; and

2 “(d) Require a marijuana processor to meet any public health and safety standards and industry
3 best practices established by the commission by rule related to:

4 “(A) Cannabinoid edibles;

5 “(B) Cannabinoid concentrates;

6 “(C) Cannabinoid extracts; and

7 “(D) Any other type of cannabinoid product identified by the commission by rule.

8 “(4) Fees adopted under subsection (3)(b) of this section:

9 “(a) May not exceed, **together with other fees collected under ORS 475B.010 to 475B.395,**
10 the cost of administering ORS 475B.010 to 475B.395 [*with respect to marijuana processors*]; and

11 “(b) Shall be deposited in the Marijuana Control and Regulation Fund established under ORS
12 475B.240.

14 **“(Wholesalers Licensed by the**
15 **Oregon Liquor Control Commission)**

16
17 **“SECTION 3.** ORS 475B.100 is amended to read:

18 “475B.100. (1) The wholesale sale of marijuana items is subject to regulation by the Oregon Li-
19 quor Control Commission.

20 “(2) A marijuana wholesaler must have a wholesale license issued by the commission for the
21 premises at which marijuana items are received, stored or delivered. To hold a wholesale license
22 under this section, a marijuana wholesaler:

23 “(a) Must apply for a license in the manner described in ORS 475B.040;

24 “(b) [*Must, until January 1, 2020, provide proof that an applicant listed on an application submit-*
25 *ted under ORS 475B.040 has been a resident of this state for two or more years, and*] Must provide
26 proof that the applicant is 21 years of age or older;

27 “(c) May not be located in an area that is zoned exclusively for residential use; and

28 “(d) Must meet the requirements of any rule adopted by the commission under subsection (3) of
29 this section.

30 “(3) The commission shall adopt rules that:

31 “(a) Require a marijuana wholesaler to annually renew a license issued under this section;

32 “(b) Establish application, licensure and renewal of licensure fees for marijuana wholesalers;

33 “(c) Require marijuana items received, stored or delivered by a marijuana wholesaler to be
34 tested in accordance with ORS 475B.555; and

35 “(d) Require a marijuana wholesaler to meet any public health and safety standards and industry
36 best practices established by the commission by rule.

37 “(4) Fees adopted under subsection (3)(b) of this section:

38 “(a) May not exceed, **together with other fees collected under ORS 475B.010 to 475B.395,**
39 the cost of administering ORS 475B.010 to 475B.395 [*with respect to marijuana wholesalers*]; and

40 “(b) Shall be deposited in the Marijuana Control and Regulation Fund established under ORS
41 475B.240.

42
43 **“(Retailers Licensed by the**
44 **Oregon Liquor Control Commission)**

1 “**SECTION 4.** ORS 475B.110 is amended to read:

2 “475B.110. (1) The retail sale of marijuana items is subject to regulation by the Oregon Liquor
3 Control Commission.

4 “(2) A marijuana retailer must have a retail license issued by the commission for the premises
5 at which marijuana items are sold. To hold a retail license under this section, a marijuana retailer:

6 “(a) Must apply for a license in the manner described in ORS 475B.040;

7 “(b) [*Must, until January 1, 2020, provide proof that an applicant listed on an application submit-*
8 *ted under ORS 475B.040 has been a resident of this state for two or more years, and*] Must provide
9 proof that the applicant is 21 years of age or older;

10 “(c) May not be located in an area that is zoned exclusively for residential use;

11 “(d) May not be located within 1,000 feet of:

12 “(A) A public elementary or secondary school for which attendance is compulsory under ORS
13 339.020; or

14 “(B) A private or parochial elementary or secondary school, teaching children as described in
15 ORS 339.030 (1)(a); and

16 “(e) Must meet the requirements of any rule adopted by the commission under subsection (3) of
17 this section.

18 “(3) The commission shall adopt rules that:

19 “(a) Require a marijuana retailer to annually renew a license issued under this section;

20 “(b) Establish application, licensure and renewal of licensure fees for marijuana retailers;

21 “(c) Require marijuana items sold by a marijuana retailer to be tested in accordance with ORS
22 475B.555; and

23 “(d) Require a marijuana retailer to meet any public health and safety standards and industry
24 best practices established by the commission by rule.

25 “(4) Fees adopted under subsection (3)(b) of this section:

26 “(a) May not exceed, **together with other fees collected under ORS 475B.010 to 475B.395,**
27 the cost of administering ORS 475B.010 to 475B.395 [*with respect to marijuana retailers*]; and

28 “(b) Shall be deposited in the Marijuana Control and Regulation Fund established under ORS
29 475B.240.

30

31 “**(Marijuana Grow Sites Registered**
32 **with the Oregon Health Authority)**

33

34 “**SECTION 5.** ORS 475B.420 is amended to read:

35 “475B.420. (1)(a) The Oregon Health Authority shall establish by rule a marijuana grow site
36 registration system to track and regulate the production of marijuana by a registry identification
37 cardholder or a person designated by the registry identification cardholder to produce marijuana for
38 the registry identification cardholder.

39 “(b) Except as provided in paragraph (c) of this subsection, a person may not produce marijuana
40 unless the person is registered under this section.

41 “(c) Paragraph (b) of this subsection does not apply to the production of marijuana as provided
42 in ORS 475B.010 to 475B.395 or as otherwise provided for by the statutory laws of this state.

43 “(2) Rules adopted under this section must require an applicant for a registry identification card,
44 or a registry identification cardholder who produces marijuana or who designates another person
45 to produce marijuana, to submit an application to the authority containing the following information

1 at the time of making an application under ORS 475B.415 (2), renewing a registry identification card
2 under ORS 475B.415 (6)(b), or notifying the authority of a change under ORS 475B.415 (6)(a):

3 “(a) The name of the person responsible for the marijuana grow site;

4 “(b) [*Proof, until January 1, 2020, that the person responsible for the marijuana grow site has been*
5 *a resident of this state for two or more years, and*] Proof that the person is 21 years of age or older;

6 “(c) The address of the marijuana grow site; and

7 “(d) Any other information that the authority considers necessary to track the production of
8 marijuana under ORS 475B.400 to 475B.525.

9 “(3)(a) The authority shall conduct a criminal records check under ORS 181A.195 of any person
10 whose name is submitted under this section as the person responsible for a marijuana grow site.

11 “(b) A person convicted of a Class A or Class B felony under ORS 475.752 to 475.920 for the
12 manufacture or delivery of a controlled substance in Schedule I or Schedule II may not act as or
13 be designated a person responsible for a marijuana grow site for two years from the date of con-
14 viction.

15 “(c) A person convicted more than once of a Class A or Class B felony under ORS 475.752 to
16 475.920 for the manufacture or delivery of a controlled substance in Schedule I or Schedule II may
17 not act as or be designated a person responsible for a marijuana grow site.

18 “(4) Subject to subsection (11) of this section, the authority shall issue a marijuana grow site
19 registration card if the requirements of subsections (2) and (3) of this section are met.

20 “(5) A person who holds a marijuana grow site registration card under this section must display
21 the card at the marijuana grow site at all times.

22 “(6) A marijuana grow site registration card must be obtained and posted for each registry
23 identification cardholder for whom marijuana is being produced at a marijuana grow site.

24 “(7)(a) All seeds, immature marijuana plants, mature marijuana plants and usable marijuana as-
25 sociated with the production of marijuana for a registry identification cardholder by a person re-
26 sponsible for a marijuana grow site are the property of the registry identification cardholder.

27 “(b) All seeds, immature marijuana plants, mature marijuana plants and usable marijuana asso-
28 ciated with the production of marijuana for a registry identification cardholder by a person re-
29 sponsible for a marijuana grow site must be transferred to the registry identification cardholder
30 upon the request of the registry identification cardholder.

31 “(c) All usable marijuana associated with the production of marijuana for a registry identifica-
32 tion cardholder by a person responsible for a marijuana grow site must be transferred to a
33 marijuana processing site upon the request of the registry identification cardholder. For purposes
34 of this paragraph, a request to transfer usable marijuana constitutes an assignment of the right to
35 possess the usable marijuana.

36 “(d) All seeds, immature marijuana plants and usable marijuana associated with the production
37 of marijuana for a registry identification cardholder by a person responsible for a marijuana grow
38 site must be transferred to a medical marijuana dispensary upon request of the registry identifica-
39 tion cardholder. For purposes of this paragraph, a request to transfer seeds, immature marijuana
40 plants or usable marijuana constitutes an assignment of the right to possess the seeds, immature
41 marijuana plants or usable marijuana.

42 “(e) Information related to transfers made under this subsection must be submitted to the au-
43 thority in the manner required by ORS 475B.423.

44 “(8) A registry identification cardholder, or the designated caregiver of a registry identification
45 cardholder, may reimburse a person responsible for a marijuana grow site for all costs associated

1 with the production of marijuana for the registry identification cardholder.

2 “(9) The authority may inspect:

3 “(a) The marijuana grow site of a person designated to produce marijuana by a registry iden-
4 tification cardholder to ensure compliance with this section and ORS 475B.423 and 475B.428 and any
5 rule adopted under this section and ORS 475B.423 and 475B.428; and

6 “(b) The records of the marijuana grow site of a person designated to produce marijuana by a
7 registry identification cardholder to ensure compliance with this section and ORS 475B.423 and any
8 rule adopted under this section and ORS 475B.423.

9 “(10) The authority may refuse to register a registry identification cardholder or a designee
10 under this section or may suspend or revoke the registration of a person responsible for a marijuana
11 grow site if the authority determines that the applicant or the person responsible for a marijuana
12 grow site violated a provision of ORS 475B.400 to 475B.525, a rule adopted under ORS 475B.400 to
13 475B.525 or an ordinance adopted pursuant to ORS 475B.500.

14 “(11) The authority may require a person responsible for a marijuana grow site, prior to issuing
15 a marijuana grow site registration card under subsection (4) of this section, to pay a fee reasonably
16 calculated to pay costs incurred under this section and ORS 475B.423 and 475B.458.

17
18 **“(Processors Registered with the**
19 **Oregon Health Authority)**
20

21 **“SECTION 6.** ORS 475B.435 is amended to read:

22 “475B.435. (1)(a) The Oregon Health Authority shall establish by rule a marijuana processing
23 site registration system to track and regulate the processing of marijuana by a person responsible
24 for a marijuana processing site.

25 “(b) Except as provided in paragraph (c) of this subsection, a person may not process marijuana
26 unless the person is registered under this section.

27 “(c) Paragraph (b) of this subsection does not apply to the processing of marijuana as provided
28 in ORS 475B.010 to 475B.395 or as otherwise provided for by the statutory laws of this state.

29 “(2) The registration system established under subsection (1) of this section must require an
30 applicant for a marijuana processing site to submit an application to the authority that includes:

31 “(a) The name of the individual who owns the marijuana processing site or, if a business entity
32 owns the marijuana processing site, the name of each individual who has a financial interest in the
33 marijuana processing site;

34 “(b) The name of the individual or individuals responsible for the marijuana processing site, if
35 different from the name of the individual who owns the marijuana processing site;

36 “(c) The address of the marijuana processing site;

37 “(d) [*Proof, until January 1, 2020, that each individual responsible for the marijuana processing*
38 *site has been a resident of this state for two or more years, and*] Proof that each individual responsible
39 for the marijuana processing site is 21 years of age or older;

40 “(e) Documentation, as required by the authority by rule, that demonstrates the marijuana pro-
41 cessing site meets the requirements of subsection (3) of this section; and

42 “(f) Any other information that the authority considers necessary.

43 “(3) To qualify for registration under this section, a marijuana processing site:

44 “(a) May not be located in an area that is zoned for residential use if the marijuana processing
45 site processes cannabinoid extracts;

1 “(b) Must be registered as a business, or have filed an application to register as a business, with
2 the office of the Secretary of State; and

3 “(c) Must meet the requirements of any rule adopted by the authority under subsection (10) of
4 this section.

5 “(4)(a) The authority shall conduct a criminal records check under ORS 181A.195 for each indi-
6 vidual named in an application under subsection (2) of this section.

7 “(b) An individual convicted for the manufacture or delivery of a controlled substance in
8 Schedule I or Schedule II may not own or be responsible for a marijuana processing site for two
9 years from the date the individual is convicted.

10 “(c) An individual convicted more than once for the manufacture or delivery of a controlled
11 substance in Schedule I or Schedule II may not own or be responsible for a marijuana processing
12 site.

13 “(5) If a person submits the application required under subsection (2) of this section, if the
14 marijuana processing site identified in the application meets the requirements of this section and
15 any rules adopted under this section and if each individual named in the application passes the
16 criminal records check required under subsection (4) of this section, the authority shall register the
17 marijuana processing site and issue proof of registration. Proof of registration must be displayed on
18 the premises of the marijuana processing site at all times.

19 “(6) A marijuana processing site that is registered under this section is not required to register
20 with the State Board of Pharmacy under ORS 475.125.

21 “(7) The individual or individuals responsible for a marijuana processing site shall maintain
22 documentation of each transfer of usable marijuana, medical cannabinoid products, cannabinoid
23 concentrates and cannabinoid extracts.

24 “(8) The authority may inspect:

25 “(a) The premises of a proposed marijuana processing site or a registered marijuana processing
26 site to ensure compliance with this section and ORS 475B.438 and 475B.440 and any rules adopted
27 under this section and ORS 475B.438 and 475B.440; and

28 “(b) The records of a registered marijuana processing site to ensure compliance with subsection
29 (7) of this section.

30 “(9) Subject to the provisions of ORS chapter 183, the authority may refuse to register an ap-
31 plicant under this section or may suspend or revoke the registration of a marijuana processing site
32 if the authority determines that the applicant, the owner of the marijuana processing site, a person
33 responsible for the marijuana processing site, or an employee of the marijuana processing site, vio-
34 lated a provision of ORS 475B.400 to 475B.525, a rule adopted under ORS 475B.400 to 475B.525 or
35 an ordinance adopted pursuant to ORS 475B.500.

36 “(10) The authority shall adopt rules to implement this section, including rules that:

37 “(a) Require a registered marijuana processing site to annually renew the registration for that
38 site;

39 “(b) Establish fees for registering, and renewing the registration of, a marijuana processing site;

40 “(c) Require that medical cannabinoid products, cannabinoid concentrates and cannabinoid ex-
41 tracts transferred by a marijuana processing site be tested to ensure the public health and safety;
42 and

43 “(d) Impose any other standard on the operation of a marijuana processing site to ensure the
44 public health and safety.

45 “**SECTION 7.** ORS 475B.443 is amended to read:

1 “475B.443. (1) A marijuana processing site may not transfer medical cannabinoid products,
2 cannabinoid concentrates or cannabinoid extracts to a person other than [*a registry identification*
3 *cardholder, a designated primary caregiver*] **another marijuana processing site** or a medical
4 marijuana dispensary.

5 “(2) A person other than a marijuana processing site may not transfer medical cannabinoid
6 products, cannabinoid concentrates or cannabinoid extracts to a medical marijuana dispensary.

7
8 **“(Medical Marijuana Dispensaries Registered**
9 **with the Oregon Health Authority)**

10
11 **“SECTION 8.** ORS 475B.450 is amended to read:

12 “475B.450. (1)(a) The Oregon Health Authority shall establish by rule a medical marijuana
13 dispensary registration system for the purpose of tracking and regulating the transfer of:

14 “(A) Usable marijuana, immature marijuana plants and seeds from registry identification
15 cardholders, designated primary caregivers and persons responsible for marijuana grow sites to
16 medical marijuana dispensaries;

17 “(B) Medical cannabinoid products, cannabinoid concentrates and cannabinoid extracts from
18 persons responsible for marijuana processing sites to medical marijuana dispensaries; and

19 “(C) Usable marijuana, immature marijuana plants, seeds, medical cannabinoid products,
20 cannabinoid concentrates and cannabinoid extracts from medical marijuana dispensaries to registry
21 identification cardholders and designated primary caregivers.

22 “(b) A person may not operate an establishment for the purpose of providing the services de-
23 scribed in paragraph (a) of this subsection unless the person is registered under this section.

24 “(2) The registration system established under subsection (1) of this section must require an
25 applicant for a medical marijuana dispensary to submit an application to the authority that includes:

26 “(a) The name of the individual who owns the medical marijuana dispensary or, if a business
27 entity owns the medical marijuana dispensary, the name of each individual who has a financial in-
28 terest in the medical marijuana dispensary;

29 “(b) The name of the individual or individuals responsible for the medical marijuana dispensary,
30 if different from the name of the individual who owns the medical marijuana dispensary;

31 “(c) The address of the medical marijuana dispensary;

32 “(d) [*Proof, until January 1, 2020, that each individual responsible for the medical marijuana*
33 *dispensary has been a resident of this state for two or more years, and*] Proof that each individual
34 responsible for the medical marijuana dispensary is 21 years of age or older;

35 “(e) Documentation, as required by the authority by rule, that demonstrates the medical
36 marijuana dispensary meets the requirements of subsection (3) of this section; and

37 “(f) Any other information that the authority considers necessary.

38 “(3) To qualify for registration under this section, a medical marijuana dispensary:

39 “(a) May not be located in an area that is zoned for residential use;

40 “(b) May not be located at the same address as a marijuana grow site;

41 “(c) Must be registered as a business, or have filed an application to register as a business, with
42 the office of the Secretary of State;

43 “(d) May not be located within 1,000 feet of:

44 “(A) A public elementary or secondary school for which attendance is compulsory under ORS
45 339.020; or

1 “(B) A private or parochial elementary or secondary school, teaching children as described in
2 ORS 339.030 (1)(a);

3 “(e) Must not be located within 1,000 feet of another medical marijuana dispensary; and

4 “(f) Must meet the requirements of any rule adopted by the authority under subsection (10) of
5 this section.

6 “(4)(a) The authority shall conduct a criminal records check under ORS 181A.195 for each indi-
7 vidual named in an application submitted under subsection (2) of this section.

8 “(b) An individual convicted for the manufacture or delivery of a controlled substance in
9 Schedule I or Schedule II may not own or be responsible for a medical marijuana dispensary for two
10 years from the date the individual is convicted.

11 “(c) An individual convicted more than once for the manufacture or delivery of a controlled
12 substance in Schedule I or Schedule II may not own or be responsible for a medical marijuana
13 dispensary.

14 “(5) If a person submits the application required under subsection (2) of this section, if the
15 medical marijuana dispensary identified in the application meets the requirements of this section and
16 any rules adopted under this section and if each individual named in the application passes the
17 criminal records check required under subsection (4) of this section, the authority shall register the
18 medical marijuana dispensary and issue proof of registration. Proof of registration must be displayed
19 on the premises of the medical marijuana dispensary at all times.

20 “(6) A medical marijuana dispensary that is registered under this section is not required to
21 register with the State Board of Pharmacy under ORS 475.125.

22 “(7) The individual or individuals responsible for a medical marijuana dispensary shall maintain
23 documentation of each transfer of usable marijuana, medical cannabinoid products, cannabinoid
24 concentrates, cannabinoid extracts, immature marijuana plants and seeds.

25 “(8) The authority may inspect:

26 “(a) The premises of a proposed medical marijuana dispensary or a registered medical marijuana
27 dispensary to ensure compliance with this section and ORS 475B.453 and any rules adopted under
28 this section or ORS 475B.453; and

29 “(b) The records of a registered medical marijuana dispensary to ensure compliance with sub-
30 section (7) of this section.

31 “(9) Subject to the provisions of ORS chapter 183, the authority may refuse to register an ap-
32 plicant under this section or may suspend or revoke the registration of a medical marijuana

30 the applicant signs and submits to the authority a written statement that:

34 applicant;

38 quency of the medical use of marijuana by the applicant.

1 performing duties under subsection (2) of this section;

2 “(b) Carry a firearm;

3 “(c) Conduct inspections and investigations of a primary residence or for purposes of
4 ensuring compliance with ORS 475B.245 and 475B.375; or

5 “(d) Except as provided under the provisions of ORS 475B.010 to 475B.395, conduct in-
6 spections and investigations for purposes of ensuring compliance with ORS 475B.400 to
7 475B.525.

8
9 “EXEMPTION FROM PUBLIC DISCLOSURE

10
11 “SECTION 21. Section 22 of this 2016 Act is added to and made a part of ORS 475B.010
12 to 475B.395.

13 “SECTION 22. (1) Subject to subsection (2) of this section, information is exempt from
14 public disclosure under ORS 192.410 to 192.505 if the information is:

15 “(a) The address of a premises for which a license has been issued or for which an ap-
16 plicant has proposed to be licensed under ORS 475B.070, 475B.090 or 485B.100;

17 “(b) Is related to the security plan or the operational plan for a premises for which a li-
18 cense has been issued or for which an applicant has proposed to be licensed under ORS
19 475B.070, 475B.090, 485B.100 or 475B.110; or

20 “(c) Is related to any record that the Oregon Liquor Control Commission determines
21 contains proprietary information of a person who holds a license under ORS 475B.070,
22 475B.090, 485B.100 or 475B.110.

23 “(2) The exemption from public disclosure as provided by this section does not apply to
24 a request for information if the request is made by a law enforcement agency.

29 “SECTION 23. ORS 475B.428 is amended to read:

30 “475B.428. (1) Subject to subsection (2) of this section, a registry identification cardholder and
31 the designated primary caregiver of the registry identification cardholder may jointly possess six
32 or fewer mature marijuana plants.

33 “(2)(a) A person may be designated to produce marijuana under ORS 475B.420 by no more than
34 four registry identification cardholders.

35 “(b) A person who is designated to produce marijuana by a registry identification cardholder
36 may produce no more than six mature marijuana plants [*per*] for a registry identification
37 cardholder[.] who designates the person to produce marijuana.

38 “(3) If the address of a person responsible for a marijuana grow site under ORS 475B.420 is lo-
39 cated within city limits in an area zoned for residential use:

40 “(a) Except as provided in paragraph (b) of this subsection, no more than 12 mature marijuana
41 plants may be produced at the address; or

42 “(b) Subject to subsection (5) of this section, if each person responsible for a marijuana grow
43 site located at the address first registered with the Oregon Health Authority under ORS 475B.420
44 before January 1, 2015, no more than the amount of mature marijuana plants located at that address
45 on December 31, 2014, in excess of 12 mature marijuana plants, not to exceed 24 mature marijuana

1 plants, may be produced at the address.

2 “(4) If the address of a person responsible for a marijuana grow site under ORS 475B.420 is lo-
3 cated in an area other than an area described in subsection (3) of this section:

4 “(a) Except as provided in paragraph (b) of this subsection, no more than 48 mature marijuana
5 plants may be produced at the address; or

6 “(b) Subject to subsections (5) and (6) of this section, if each person responsible for a marijuana
7 grow site located at the address first registered with the authority under ORS 475B.420 before
8 January 1, 2015, no more than the amount of mature marijuana plants located at that address on
9 December 31, 2014, in excess of 48 mature marijuana plants, not to exceed 96 mature marijuana
10 plants, may be produced at the address.

11 “(5) If the authority suspends or revokes the registration of a person responsible for a marijuana
12 grow site that is located at an address described in subsection (3)(b) or (4)(b) of this section:

13 “(a) No more than 12 mature marijuana plants may be subsequently produced at any address
14 described in subsection (3) of this section at which the person responsible for that marijuana grow
15 site produces marijuana.

16 “(b) No more than 48 mature marijuana plants may be subsequently produced at any address
17 described in subsection (4) of this section at which the person responsible for that marijuana grow
18 site produces marijuana.

19 “(6) If a registry identification cardholder who designated a person to produce marijuana for the
20 registry identification cardholder pursuant to ORS 475B.420 terminates the designation, the person
21 responsible for the marijuana grow site whose designation has been terminated may not be desig-
22 nated to produce marijuana by another registry identification cardholder, except that the person
23 may be designated by another registry identification cardholder if no more than 48 mature
24 marijuana plants are produced at the address for the marijuana grow site at which the person
25 produces marijuana.

26 “(7) **Subject to the limits described in subsections (2) to (6) of this section, if multiple**
27 **persons responsible for a marijuana grow site under ORS 475B.420 are located at the same**
28 **address, the persons designated to produce marijuana by registry identification cardholders**

2 “(a) A person responsible for a marijuana grow site registered under ORS 475B.420, or,
3 if multiple persons responsible for a marijuana grow site registered under ORS 475B.420 are
4 located at the same address, each person responsible for a marijuana grow site located at
5 the address, may apply for a license under ORS 475B.070 to transition from being registered
6 by the Oregon Health Authority to being licensed by the commission;

7 “(b) A marijuana processing site registered under ORS 475B.435 may apply for a license
8 under ORS 475B.090 to transition from being registered by the authority to being licensed
9 by the commission; and

10 “(c) A medical marijuana dispensary registered under ORS 475B.450 may apply for a li-
11 cense under ORS 475B.110 to transition from being registered by the authority to being li-
12 censed by the commission.

13 “(2)(a) In adopting rules under this section, the commission shall adopt, at a minimum,
14 procedures by which the inventory possessed by a person responsible for a marijuana grow
15 site, a marijuana processing site or a medical marijuana dispensary on the date on which the
16 person responsible for a marijuana grow site, the marijuana processing site or the medical
17 marijuana dispensary is first subject to tracking by the commission under ORS 475B.150:

18 “(A) May be delivered to a premises for which a license has been issued under ORS
19 475B.090, 475B.100 or 475B.110; or

20 “(B) May be sold to consumers by marijuana retailers that hold a license under ORS
21 475B.110.

22 “(b) Procedures adopted under this subsection must require a person responsible for a
23 marijuana grow site registered under ORS 475B.420, or, if multiple persons responsible for a
24 marijuana grow site registered under ORS 475B.420 are located at the same address, each
25 person responsible for a marijuana grow site located at the address, to return to an individ-
26 ual to whom a registry identification card has been issued under ORS 475B.415, and for whom
27 the person or persons are producing marijuana, all the marijuana and usable marijuana
28 owned by the individual, except as otherwise allowed under a personal agreement entered
29 into under ORS 475B.425, at the time that the person or the persons receive a license under
30 ORS 475B.070.

31
32 “TAXATION OF CANNABIS AND CANNABIS PRODUCTS
33

34 “**SECTION 26.** ORS 475B.705 is amended to read:

35 “475B.705. (1) A tax is hereby imposed upon the retail sale of marijuana items in this state. The
36 tax imposed by this section is a direct tax on the consumer, for which payment upon retail sale is
37 required [*to achieve convenience and facility in the collection and administration of the tax*]. The tax
38 shall be collected at the point of sale of a marijuana item by a marijuana retailer at the time at
39 which the retail sale occurs.

40 “(2) The tax imposed under this section shall be imposed at the rate of:

41 “(a) 17 percent of the retail sales price of marijuana leaves;

42 “(b) 17 percent of the retail sales price of marijuana flowers;

43 “(c) 17 percent of the retail sales price of immature marijuana plants;

44 “(d) 17 percent of the retail sales price of a cannabinoid edible;

45 “(e) 17 percent of the retail sales price of a cannabinoid concentrate;

1 “(f) 17 percent of the retail sales price of a cannabinoid extract;

2 “(g) 17 percent of the retail sales price of a cannabinoid product that is intended to be used by

3 applying the cannabinoid product to the skin or hair; and

4 “(h) 17 percent of the retail sales price of cannabinoid products other than those described in

5 paragraph (g) of this subsection.

6 “(3) If the tax imposed under this section does not equal an amount calculable to a whole cent,

7 the tax shall be equal to the next higher whole cent.

8 “(4) **Except as otherwise provided by the Department of Revenue by rule**, the amount of

9 the tax shall be separately stated on an invoice, receipt or other similar document that the

10 marijuana retailer provides to the consumer[, *or shall be otherwise disclosed to the consumer.*] **at the**

11 **time at which the retail sale occurs.**

12 “(5) A person may not knowingly sell, purchase, install, transfer or possess **electronic devices**

13 **or** software programs [*or other electronic devices intended to hide or to remove records of retail sales*

14 *of marijuana items or to falsify records of retail sales of marijuana items.*] **for the purposes of:**

15 “(a) **Hiding or removing records of retail sales of marijuana items; or**

16 “(b) **Falsifying records of retail sales of marijuana items.**

17 “(6)(a) **A marijuana retailer may not discount a marijuana item or offer a marijuana item**

18 **for free if the retail sale of the marijuana item is made in conjunction with the retail sale**

19 **of any other item.**

20 “(b) **Paragraph (a) of this subsection does not affect any provision of ORS 475B.010 to**

21 **475B.395 or any rule adopted by the Oregon Liquor Control Commission pursuant to ORS**

22 **475B.010 to 475B.395 that is related to the retail sale of marijuana items.**

23 “**SECTION 27.** ORS 475B.710 is amended to read:

24 “475B.710. (1) Except as otherwise provided in ORS 475B.700 to 475B.760, the tax imposed upon

25 the consumer under ORS 475B.705 shall be collected at the point of sale and remitted by each

26 marijuana retailer that engages in the retail sale of marijuana items. The tax is [*considered*] a tax

27 upon the marijuana retailer that is required to collect the tax, and the marijuana retailer is [*con-*

28 *sidered*] a taxpayer.

5 than \$1,000, the [*entire*] **remaining** refund shall be applied as a credit against the next subsequent
6 calendar quarter as an estimated payment.

7 “[*(9)*] **(10)** The department may not make a refund of, or credit, any overpayment of tax under
8 ORS 475B.700 to 475B.760 that was credited to the account of a marijuana retailer under subsection
9 [*(8)(b)*] **(9)(b)** of this section if the return for that tax period is not filed within three years after the
10 due date of that return.

29 tober 1, 1991. Federal pension income that is attributable to federal employment occurring before
30 October 1, 1991, shall be determined by multiplying the total amount of federal pension income for
31 the tax year by the ratio of the number of months of federal creditable service occurring before

9 “(h) If included in taxable income for federal tax purposes, the amount withdrawn during the tax
10 year in qualified withdrawals from a savings network account for higher education established under
11 ORS 178.300 to 178.355.

12 “[i] *Any federal deduction that the taxpayer would have been allowed for the production, pro-*
13 *cessing or sale of marijuana items authorized under ORS 475B.010 to 475B.395 but for section 280E*
14 *of the Internal Revenue Code.*]

15 “[j] (i) If included in taxable income for federal tax purposes, any distributions from an ABLE
16 account that do not exceed the qualified disability expenses of the designated beneficiary as pro-
17 vided in ORS 178.375 and 178.380 and rules adopted by the Oregon 529 Savings Board.

18 “(2) There shall be added to federal taxable income:

19 “(a) Interest or dividends, exempt from federal income tax, on obligations or securities of any
20 foreign state or of a political subdivision or authority of any foreign state. However, the amount
21 added under this paragraph shall be reduced by any interest on indebtedness incurred to carry the
22 obligations or securities described in this paragraph and by any expenses incurred in the production

5 years of age is a specific fine violation. The presumptive fine for a violation under this paragraph is
6 \$650.]

7 “[4](a) Unlawful possession of more than 16 avoirdupois ounces of marijuana product in a solid
8 form or more than 72 ounces of marijuana product in a liquid form by a person under 21 years of age
9 is a Class A misdemeanor.]

22 “[b] (c) More than eight ounces of usable marijuana.

23 “[c] (d) More than 16 ounces of cannabinoid products in solid form or cannabinoid concen-
24 trates.

25 “[d] (e) More than 72 ounces of cannabinoid products in liquid form.

26 “[e] (f) More than one ounce of cannabinoid extracts.

27 “[f] (g) A cannabinoid extract that was not purchased from a marijuana retailer that holds a
28 license under ORS 475B.110.

29 “[7] (2) A violation of subsection [(6)(a)] (1)(a) to [(e)] (f) of this section is a:

30 “(a) Class A misdemeanor, if the amount possessed is more than four times the applicable max-
31 imum amount specified in subsection [(6)(a)] (1)(a) to [(e)] (f) of this section;

32 “(b) Class B misdemeanor, if the amount possessed is more than two times, but not more than
33 four times, the applicable maximum amount specified in subsection [(6)(a)] (1)(a) to [(e)] (f) of this
34 section; or

35 “(c) Class B violation, if the amount possessed is not more than two times the applicable maxi-
36 mum amount specified in subsection [(6)(a)] (1)(a) to [(e)] (f) of this section.

37 “[8] (3) A violation of subsection [(6)(f)] (1)(g) of this section is a:

38 “(a) Class C felony, if the amount possessed is more than one-quarter ounce of [the] cannabinoid
39 extract; or

40 “(b) Class B misdemeanor, if the amount possessed is not more than one-quarter ounce of [the]
41 cannabinoid extract.

42 “**SECTION 47. (1) Except for licensees and licensee representatives acting in accordance**
43 **with ORS 475B.010 to 475B.395, and any rule adopted under ORS 475B.010 to 475B.395, it is**
44 **unlawful for any person under 21 years of age to knowingly or intentionally possess:**

9 a license under ORS 475B.110.

10 “(2) A violation of this section is a Class A misdemeanor.

12 “(Motor Vehicle Use)

13
14 “SECTION 48. Section 49 of this 2016 Act is added to and made a part of the Oregon
15 Vehicle Code.

16 “SECTION 49. (1) As used in this section:

17 “(a) ‘Consumes’ includes the inhalation of smoke from a marijuana item by a driver or
18 passenger of a motor vehicle.

19 “(b) ‘Marijuana item’ has the meaning given that term in ORS 475B.015.

20 “(2) A person commits the offense of use of marijuana in a motor vehicle if the person
21 consumes in any manner a marijuana item while in a motor vehicle when the motor vehicle
22 is upon a highway.

23 “(3) This section does not apply to passengers in a motor vehicle that is operated by a
24 common carrier and used primarily to carry passengers for hire.

25 “(4) Use of marijuana in a motor vehicle, is a Class B traffic violation.

30 “SECTION 51. (1) As used in this section, ‘cannabinoid concentrate,’ ‘cannabinoid ex-
31 tract,’ ‘medical cannabinoid product,’ ‘registry identification card’ and ‘usable marijuana’
32 have the meanings given those terms in ORS 475B.410.

33 “(2) Notwithstanding ORS 137.540, the conditions of supervision of a person who holds a
34 registry identification card and is sentenced to probation related to the use of usable
35 marijuana, medical cannabinoid products, cannabinoid concentrates or cannabinoid extracts
36 must be imposed in the same manner as the conditions of supervision of a person sentenced
37 to probation related to prescription drugs.

38 “SECTION 52. Section 53 of this 2016 Act is added to and made a part of ORS chapter 144.

39 “SECTION 53. (1) As used in this section, ‘cannabinoid concentrate,’ ‘cannabinoid ex-
40 tract,’ ‘medical cannabinoid product,’ ‘registry identification card’ and ‘usable marijuana’
41 have the meanings given those terms in ORS 475B.410.

42 “(2) Notwithstanding ORS 144.102 and 144.270, the conditions of supervision of a person
43 who holds a registry identification card and is released from prison or jail to post-prison
44 supervision or parole related to the use of usable marijuana, medical cannabinoid products,
45 cannabinoid concentrates or cannabinoid extracts must be imposed in the same manner as

1 the conditions of supervision of a person sentenced to probation related to prescription
2 drugs.

3 **“SECTION 53a.** Section 53b of this 2016 Act is added to and made a part of ORS 135.230
4 to 135.290.

5 **“SECTION 53b.** (1) As used in this section, ‘cannabinoid concentrate,’ ‘cannabinoid ex-
6 tract,’ ‘medical cannabinoid product,’ ‘registry identification card’ and ‘usable marijuana’

8 **“(2)** Notwithstanding ORS 135.245, the conditions of release of a person who holds a reg-

12 lated to prescription drugs.

30 judgment related to the use of usable marijuana, medical cannabinoid products, cannabinoid
31 concentrates or cannabinoid extracts must be imposed in the same manner as the conditions
32 of a release agreement of a person who is released before judgment related to the use of
33 prescription drugs.

44 substantial personal injury, or inflicts any substantial personal injury, upon a person on the prem-
45 ises other than the tenant;

1 “(b) The tenant or someone in the tenant’s control recklessly endangers a person on the prem-
2 ises other than the tenant by creating a serious risk of substantial personal injury;

3 “(c) The tenant, someone in the tenant’s control or the tenant’s pet inflicts any substantial
4 personal injury upon a neighbor living in the immediate vicinity of the premises;

5 “(d) The tenant or someone in the tenant’s control intentionally inflicts any substantial damage
6 to the premises or the tenant’s pet inflicts substantial damage to the premises on more than one
7 occasion;

8 “(e)(A) The tenant intentionally provided substantial false information on the application for the
9 tenancy within the past year;

10 “(B) The false information was with regard to a criminal conviction of the tenant that would
11 have been material to the landlord’s acceptance of the application; and

12 “(C) The landlord terminates the rental agreement within 30 days after discovering the falsity
13 of the information; or

17 (a) to (e) of this subsection, but is similar in degree and is one that a reasonable person in that
18 community would consider to be so offensive as to warrant termination of the tenancy within 24
19 hours, considering the seriousness of the act or the risk to others. An act that is outrageous in the
20 extreme is more extreme or serious than an act that warrants a 30-day termination under ORS
21 90.392. Acts that are ‘outrageous in the extreme’ include, but are not limited to, the following acts
22 by a person:

23 “(A) Prostitution, commercial sexual solicitation or promoting prostitution, as described in ORS
24 167.007, 167.008 and 167.012;

25 “(B) Manufacture, delivery or possession of a controlled substance, as described in ORS 475.005,
26 but not including:

27 “(i) The medical use of marijuana in compliance with ORS 475B.400 to 475B.525; **or**

29 *marijuana as described in ORS 475.860 (3) or 475.864 (3); or]*

30 “[*iii*] **(ii)** Possession of prescription drugs;

32 “(D) Burglary as described in ORS 164.215 and 164.225.

33 “(2) If the cause for a termination notice given pursuant to subsection (1) of this section is based
34 upon the acts of the tenant’s pet, the tenant may cure the cause and avoid termination of the
35 tenancy by removing the pet from the premises prior to the end of the notice period. The notice
36 must describe the right of the tenant to cure the cause. If the tenant returns the pet to the premises
37 at any time after having cured the violation, the landlord, after at least 24 hours’ written notice
38 specifying the subsequent presence of the offending pet, may terminate the rental agreement and

45 disposition without a hearing.

1 “**SECTION 57.** ORS 419C.443 is amended to read:

2 “419C.443. (1) Except when otherwise provided in subsection (3) of this section, when a youth
3 offender has been found to be within the jurisdiction of the court under ORS 419C.005 for a first
4 violation of the provisions under ORS 475.860 [(3)(b) or 475.864 (3)(c)], the court shall order an
5 evaluation and designate agencies or organizations to perform diagnostic assessment and provide
6 programs of information and treatment. The designated agencies or organizations must meet the
7 standards set by the Director of the Oregon Health Authority. Whenever possible, the court shall
8 designate agencies or organizations to perform the diagnostic assessment that are separate from
9 those that may be designated to carry out a program of information or treatment. The parent of the
10 youth offender shall pay the cost of the youth offender’s participation in the program based upon

20 “(c) A controlled substance in Schedule III, is guilty of a Class C felony, except as otherwise

20 “(2) As part of the pilot project, the authority shall implement a multimedia public
21 campaign targeting youth and young adults at least 12 years of age and not older than 20
22 years of age and parents and teachers.

23 “(3) At a minimum, the authority shall implement the pilot project in one metropolitan
24 area located in this state and in one rural area of significant size located in this state.

25 “(4) The authority shall monitor and collect data on the effectiveness of the pilot project
26 established under this section.

27 “(5) The Oregon Liquor Control Commission shall assist, pursuant to an agreement or
28 otherwise, the authority in establishing the pilot project under this section.

29 “(6) On or before January 1, 2017, the authority shall report to the interim legislative
30 committees related to health, and any interim legislative committee specifically related to
31 marijuana use, on the implementation of the pilot project established under this section and
32 on further steps required to implement a statewide program during the 2017-2019 biennium.
33 The report shall be made in the manner provided by ORS 192.245 and may include recom-
34 mendations for legislation.

35
36 **“CLINICAL GUIDELINES WORK GROUP**

37
38 **“SECTION 72.** (1) The Oregon Health Authority shall convene a work group to develop
39 recommendations related to attending physicians who diagnose individuals as having a de-
40 bilitating medical condition, as defined in ORS 475B.410, and who recommend the medical use
41 of marijuana for the purpose of mitigating the symptoms or effects of a debilitating medical
42 condition.

43 “(2) The work group convened under this section shall include at least one attending
44 physician who has diagnosed an individual as having a debilitating medical condition and at
45 least one individual for whom the medical use of marijuana has been recommended for the

1 purpose of mitigating the symptoms or effects of a debilitating medical condition. The work
2 group convened under this section shall include additional members as the authority con-
3 sidered necessary to carry out the duties of the work group.

4 “(3) At a minimum, the work group convened under this section shall develop guidelines
5 for attending physicians to follow when recommending the medical use of marijuana for the
6 purpose of mitigating the symptoms or effects of a debilitating medical condition.

7 “(4) On or before January 1, 2017, the authority shall report to the interim legislative
8 committees related to health, and any interim legislative committee specifically related to
9 the regulation of the medical use of marijuana, on the recommendations developed by the
10 work group. The report shall be made in the manner provided by ORS 192.245 and may in-
11 clude recommendations for legislation.

13 **“REPORTS**

14 **“(By the Oregon Liquor Control Commission)**

15
16 **“SECTION 73. On or before January 1, 2017, the Oregon Liquor Control Commission shall**
17 **report to the interim legislative committees related to business, and any interim legislative**
18 **committee specifically related to businesses that produce marijuana, on rules adopted by the**
19 **commission under ORS 475B.070 (3)(d) related to assisting the viability of marijuana produc-**
20 **ers that are independently owned and operated and are limited in size and revenue with re-**
21 **spect to other marijuana producers. The report shall be made in the manner provided by ORS**
22 **192.245.**

23
24 **“(By the Oregon Health Authority)**

25
26 **“SECTION 74. On or before January 1, 2017, the Oregon Health Authority shall report to**
27 **the interim legislative committees related to the environment, and any interim legislative**
28 **committee specifically related to businesses that sell marijuana or marijuana-derived pro-**
29 **ducts, on rules adopted by the authority or steps otherwise taken by the authority related**
30 **to recalling marijuana or marijuana-derived products that are contaminated and unfit for**
31 **human consumption. The report shall be made in the manner provided by ORS 192.245 and**
32 **may include recommendations for legislation.**

33
34 **“SUNSET FOR SECTIONS 71, 73, 74 AND 75**

35
36 **“SECTION 75. Sections 71, 72, 73 and 74 of this 2016 Act are repealed on January 2, 2018.**

40 **“SECTION 76. ORS 475B.120, 475B.285 and 811.481 are repealed.**

41 **“SECTION 77. Sections 173 and 175b, chapter 614, Oregon Laws 2015, are repealed.**

43 **“APPLICABILITY**

45 **“SECTION 78. The amendments to ORS 475.856, 475.858, 475.860, 475.862, 475.864 and**

1 475B.185 by sections 39 and 42 to 46 of this 2016 Act apply to conduct occurring on or after
2 the operative date specified in section 79 of this 2016 Act.

6 "SECTION 79. (1) Sections 14 to 18, 21, 22, 24, 25, 30, 33 to 35, 40, 41, 47 to 53f, 69 and 71
7 to 75 of this 2016 Act, the amendments to statutes and session law by sections 1 to 13, 19,
8 20, 23, 26, 27, 31, 32, 36 to 39, 42 to 46 and 54 to 68 of this 2016 Act and the repeal of statutes
9 and session law by sections 76 and 77 of this 2016 Act become operative on March 1, 2016.

10 "(2) The Oregon Liquor Control Commission, Oregon Health Authority and Department
11 of Revenue may take any action before the operative date specified in subsection (1) of this

16 to statutes and session law by sections 1 to 13, 19, 20, 23, 26, 27, 31, 32, 36 to 39, 42 to 46 and
17 54 to 68 of this 2016 Act and the repeal of statutes and session law by sections 76 and 77 of
18 this 2016 Act.

19 "SECTION 80. The amendments to ORS 475B.760 by section 70 of this 2016 Act become
20 operative on January 1, 2017.

24 "SECTION 81. The unit captions used in this 2016 Act are provided only for the conven-
25 ience of the reader and do not become part of the statutory law of this state or express any
26 legislative intent in the enactment of this 2016 Act.

28 "EMERGENCY CLAUSE

29
30 "SECTION 82. This 2016 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public
31 peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2016 Act takes effect
32 on its passage."
